A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...



You may well be wondering what those things are in the photo. And honestly, you're not likely to guess.

As part of the project to preserve Immanuel's beautiful stained glass windows, it was necessary to bore holes through the window frames so that heat

and moisture would not get trapped between the old windows and the protective panes that were being installed. Otherwise the act of protection would actually lead to further deterioration of the stained glass.

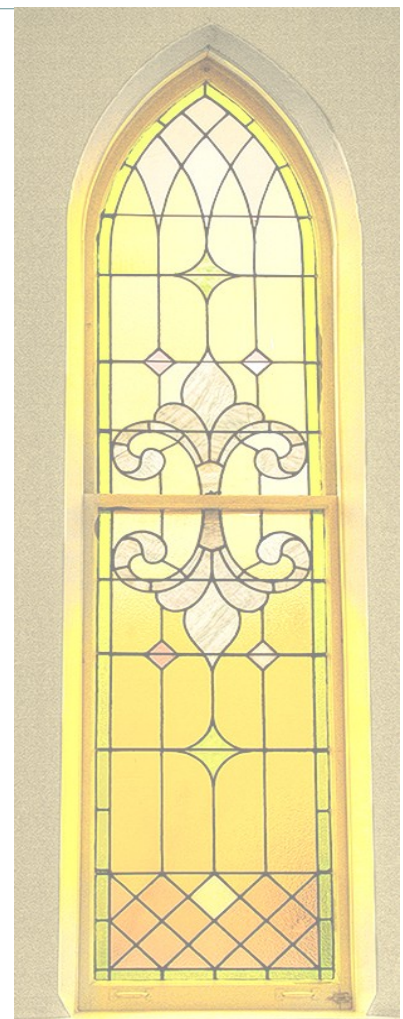
What you see in the photo are some of the plugs of wood that were removed in order to install the ventilators. As the workers were drilling, I happened to walk through the sanctuary and saw them lying on the windowsill. I was absolutely amazed at the fact that the wood was fresh and clean, and smelled like new lumber. To be sure, on the ends you could see layer upon layer of paint, and under that the original dark stain and varnish, painted over before I was even born. But inside, at its core, the wood was as pristine as when the windows were installed some 125 years ago.

Looking at those plugs of wood, I was struck by the realization that this is something of a parable. We look around our congregation, and we may see signs of age ... both in the physical plant and in our people. But you see, if you were to bore through what we see on the exterior, the "layers of paint," as it were, that have accrued over the years, you would find that at the core is something still fresh, and new, and vibrant. The Good News we proclaim is ever new, for every age, and can and must always be rediscovered for a new time in history.

That being said, sometimes we have to drill through some of the layered-on accretions of time in order to find the fresh core of what God has for us here. Sometimes we need to bore some holes here and there so that fresh air can come sweeping in. We must never "preserve" the Church in ways that cause further deterioration. We must always be looking for the new thing the Spirit is trying to do.

So, how might the Spirit be working to uncover the "fresh core" here at Immanuel? Maybe that's our question for the new year.

Notice of Annual Congregational Meeting

Immanuel Lutheran Church will hold its Annual Congregational Meeting Sunday, January 28, 2018 at 12:00 pm in Fellowship Hall. In addition to regular business, the agenda will include amendments to our Constitution and Bylaws. These amendments include recommended changes from the *ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations*, along with amendments being recommended by Council. Because of the varying requirements for amending the Constitution and Bylaws, the amendments will be presented as four resolutions.

- 1) Amendments to our Constitution to bring it into line with the *ELCA's Model Constitution for Congregations*, that become effective immediately upon congregational approval;
- 2) Amendments to our Constitution that will require a simple majority vote at the 2018 Annual Meeting and a 2/3 majority vote to ratify at the 2019 Annual Meeting;
- 3) Amendments to the Bylaws that will become effective immediately upon congregational approval;
- 4) An amendment to the Bylaws that will become effective in 2019, assuming ratification of the amendments to the Constitution.

Copies of the proposed amendments have been sent to voting members. If you have not received a copy, contact the Church Office. Per our Constitution, to be a voting member, you must have communed within the past year and must have given a contribution of record.

A forum to discuss the amendments will be held after coffee hour on Sunday, Jan. 7, and one to discuss the budget on Sunday, Jan. 21.

A Message from the Choir Director

The season of Epiphany leads us through the beginning of Jesus' ministry with multiple references to light, the star and ultimately Jesus' transfiguration. Our choral anthems will reflect these themes in the season as well.

We begin Epiphany with an ethereal original piece by Mark Schweizer called "Eternal Light." As our Scriptures lead us through Jesus' calling of the first disciples, Paul reminds us to glorify God with our bodies which will be reflected in Anton Bruckner's beautiful setting of "Locus Iste." Its text states: "This place was made by God, a priceless mystery; it is without reproof." We then worship with a lovely tonal setting of Venite post me by Nobauki Izawa (Come ye after me, and I will make you to be fishers of men: and they, leaving their nets and boats, followed the Lord.)

As Jesus' ministry turns to healing, the choir will sing "There is Balm in Gilead" by William Dawson and "The Mighty One" by Tom Fettke. We will close the season with the feast of Christ's Transfiguration and a lovely chant-like setting by Morten Lauridsen.

Window Preservation Project Update

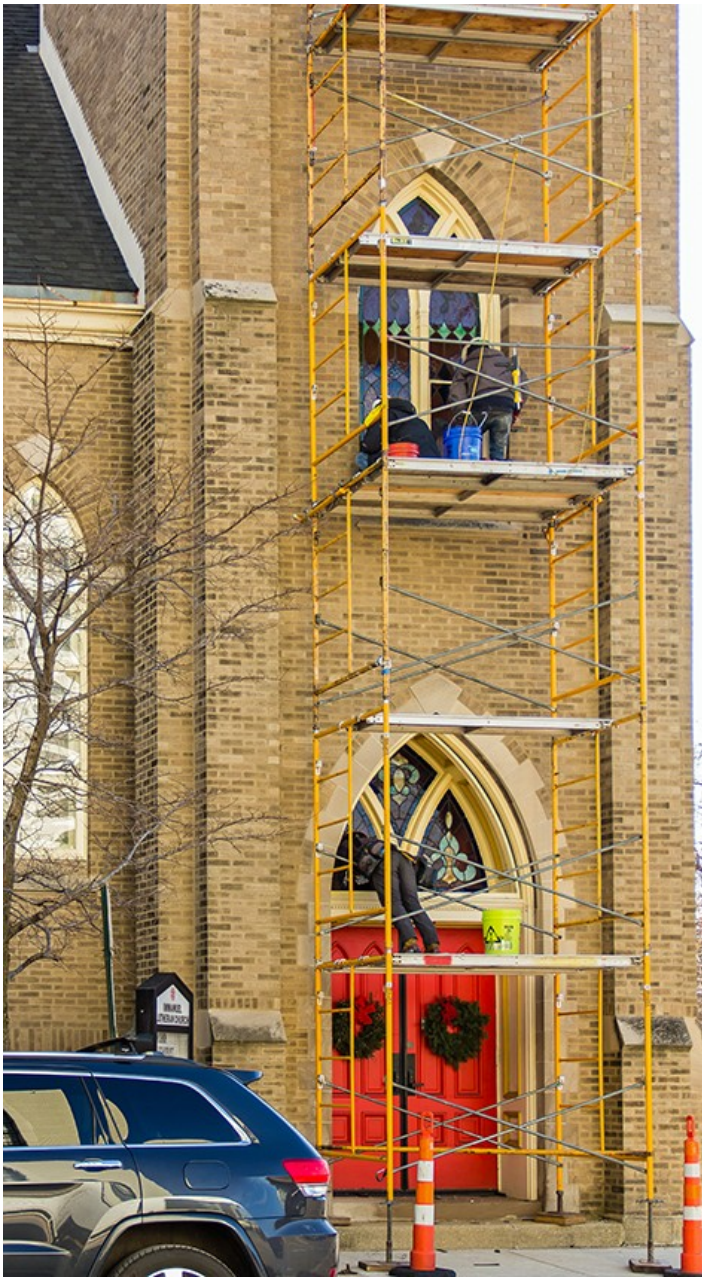
In spite of bitter cold, the intrepid craftsmen from Bovard Studio, Inc., have been laboring over the past few months to install the protective windows that the congregation ordered almost a year ago. There was a lot of upfront work to measure and fabricate the panels. Once on-site, there was a great deal of preparation and preservation work that had to be done before the panels could be lifted into place. Rotted wood needed to be dealt with, old paint had to be scraped and primed, and then all the frames had to be repainted. The crews worked in sometimes subzero temperatures, often laboring late into the night on scaffolding protected only by tarps, with electric heaters blazing. The crews typically work for a full week, then travel home to Fairfield, Iowa for a week with their families, and then back on the road.

Bovard is one of the premier stained-glass studios in the country, and they keep crews working year-round at sites all over the United States. They are considered experts in the preservation of historic windows.

Our project was largely a preservation project, with a limited amount of actual restoration. Two panels from the largest windows are taken out and releded in Bovard's shop. Elsewhere in the sanctuary, a limited number of repairs were made where there was missing or shattered glass. In addition, a protective paste was brushed into every crevice of leading on all windows, which will help some with air penetration and will help preserve the lead.

The project was temporarily financed by borrowing from the Pastor's Housing Fund, but that money must be paid back. A capital campaign to cover the costs of the window project, steeple repairs, sanctuary interior painting, and office renovation will be held beginning this spring. We hope that you will be generous in helping keep our beautiful building fresh and ready to welcome new members and guests for years to come. Neighbors have commented on how thrilled they are to see that we are "open for business." And two of our Christmas Eve guests said they had come because they had seen the activity!

Appendix A: Pastor's Report: November 19, 2017

Worship: This past month has been full of amazing gatherings for worship, from our joint worship service with St. Paul's on the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, to our common prayer service with the Catholics and Lutherans of Evanston, to the historic service at Holy Name Cathedral, to the soul-stirring All Saints worship here at Immanuel, we have been strengthened, built-up, and encouraged in looking toward God's future. I heard many good things from the folks at St. Paul's about our common worship, and I think all of us were lifted up by the glorious music we experienced that day, as well as the fellowship around both the Eucharistic table and the potluck table. Many, many thanks to all those who worked so hard to make these services come together.

Advent begins Dec. 3. Our liturgical setting will change to Setting 5. We will also have Midweek Advent Prayer using *Holden Evening Prayer* at 7:00 PM each Wednesday. People have found these services to be very moving in their simplicity and beauty, and I hope a number of folks will be able to attend.

On Thursday, Dec. 14, Grace Lutheran Church is holding a Blue Christmas service to which we have been invited to participate. Blue Christmas is a service that acknowledges that the holidays may be times of sadness for many, rather than a time of joy.

Congregational ministries: There is some excellent energy I'm sensing lately as ministries are moving forward. It's exciting to me to see that Café Immanuel is thriving, and that the Farmers' Market is back. Our guests at both of these have been quite vocal in expressing to me their gratitude for the hospitality that we extend. One of the guests at Café shook my hand and told me how much he looked forward to coming each month, not only because the food is good, but because he is treated with dignity as a guest. Greeting people at the Market, person after person told me how grateful they were that we served the community in this way, and how important it is to them that this is a market with a purpose. These things matter.

The other things we are doing matter, as well. Quilting moves forward with vigor, Social Ministry reaches out in vital ways, the Stark committee makes important decisions for us about grants to important ministries, our musicians make beautiful contributions... on and on and on. I'm gratified to see that the Welcome taskforce is beginning its work, and I look forward to seeing how that will bear fruit.

Last week, Immanuel played host to a "Pop-Up Public Church Happy Hour," organized by the seminary. And while almost no one from the other congregations came, Immanuel leaders came out in force to talk about what we are doing here. And then a group of eight leaders came together to begin working with a consultant the Synod has hired to help us develop a culture of generosity and gratitude in the congregation. I'm grateful for the dedication and enthusiasm that I'm seeing, and I hope you'll join me in praying that God will show us how we are best to serve.

Spiritual Formation: We're currently involved in a brief series on liturgy and ritual. A product of this course is a booklet I've created that explains the liturgy step by step. Copies of the booklet will be kept in the Narthex and passthrough for people to take so they can educate themselves about what we do in the service. Coming up in Advent will be a devotional series based on a collection of daily Advent reflections.

Ecumenical: The Evanston Interfaith Clergy and Leaders group through their advocacy with the City Council has recently secured a commitment to affordable housing in Evanston. They are also asking each member congregation to consider a response to the question of sanctuary for immigrants and refugees. I would like us to take up their statement and see how we would like to respond.

Pastoral: We grieve the loss of Pr. Royce Scherf, who died Oct. 27. We will remember Pr. Scherf at the end of service one Sunday in the coming weeks.
