#### **Facilities**

- Our parking lot is located on the south side of the church off Sherman Avenue. You may park in the lot at any time, whether for church events or for shopping or other errands in downtown Evanston; weekdays, see the church office at the Lake St. entrance to get a parking pass. On Sundays, additional parking is available across the street at the Holiday Inn or in Lot 6 on Lake St. across from the Police and Fire Headquarters. Parking meters are free on Sunday!
- The parking lot entrance is an accessible entrance. An elevator is located just inside that door.
- Restrooms are downstairs near the meeting of the two hallways. Accessible restrooms are located near the
  elevator on both upper and lower levels. A gender-neutral restroom is located on the lower level by the
  elevator.
- We love having children in worship! There is a nursery and changing/crying room for parents to use, if needed, located downstairs. There are also changing tables in both restrooms on this level, by the elevator. An usher will be happy to direct you.
- Hearing assistance is available. Ask an usher for equipment.
- Wi-Fi is available throughout most of the building. The network is "Immanuel," password "allarewelcome". Please use the Internet responsibly!

### **About Our Worship**

Our Sunday worship is organized around the proclamation of the Word of God and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. It has a familiar form each week, but the content changes for each service according to a calendar shared with many other Christians. The liturgy and hymns are printed in this bulletin for your convenience.

### **Receiving Holy Communion**

We invite you to share with us in the sacramental meal, because Christ himself invites you! At the direction of the usher, come forward if you are able, and join the line. Receive the bread in the palm of your hand. (Gluten-free wafers are available. Please indicate to the pastor if you need that.) You may eat it immediately, then take the silver chalice and drink from it or, if you prefer, take a small cup from the tray. The cups in the outer ring contain wine. The cups in the center contain grape juice for those who prefer that. When you have drunk, place your empty cup in the trays provided on the first row of chairs. Return to your place via the side aisles after you have communed. If you need to have Communion brought to you, please sit on the aisle, and let either the pastor or an usher know before the service that you would like to commune at your seat. If you desire a blessing but not the sacrament, you are invited to come forward with everyone else and fold your arms over your chest to indicate this.

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.


### **Preface**

P It is indeed right to give you our thanks and praise, O God, for in tenderness and faithful love you forgive our sins and guide us when we stray. ## Thanksgiving at the Table

P God of our weary years, God of our silent tears, you have brought us this far along the way. In times of bitterness you did not abandon us, but guided us into the path of love and light. In every age you sent prophets to make known your loving will for all humanity. The cry of the poor has become your own cry; our hunger and thirst for justice is your own desire. 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

# Martin Luther, renewer of the church, d. 1546 Sunday, February 18, 2018

Though he began his adult church life as a simple Augustinian monk, Luther challenged the abuses he saw in the church, and his work eventually led to the Protestant Reformation. Luther's accomplishments included liturgical reform, translation of the Bible, and creation of the Small and Large Catechisms.

# Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, martyr, d. 156 Friday, February 23, 2018

Because he is said to have been known by John, the author of Revelation, as well as the important early church fathers Irenaeus and Ignatius, Polycarp serves as a vital link in church history. He was burned at the stake at age 86 for refusing to renounce his faith.



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## **Sharing the Wilderness**

Have you ever experienced the disappointment of coming down from a "mountaintop" experience? Away at a camp or retreat you experience something profound, something that feels like it will transform your life forever. But when you return to everyday life you feel surrounded by obstacles to lasting change. Sometimes our baptismal life as Christians can feel like this. In worship, gathered with sisters and brothers in faith, we can experience God's presence, but then we go back out into our everyday lives and everything becomes more challenging.

Mark's gospel shows us that even Jesus experienced mountaintops and valleys in his spiritual life. Jesus moves very quickly from splashing in the baptismal waters of the Jordan River and receiving signs and words of divine encouragement into a lonely wilderness where for the next forty days he is tempted and tested. It is with both experiences behind him, the highs and the lows, that Jesus begins his ministry and his bold proclamation that God's kingdom has come near.

As we gather for the season of Lent, we are reminded that in our own baptisms God's kingdom has come near. We have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. Those who gather for worship each week will be a mixed group—some experiencing that strong affirmation, some feeling lost in the wilderness, and others somewhere between. Yet Christ's proclamation is for all. God's kingdom has come near. God's promises hold true for us all no matter what we are feeling any particular week. In worship, we both affirm those around us and receive the gift of their affirmation. We gather both to give and to receive Jesus' proclamation.
