Facilities

- Our parking lot is located on the south side of the church off Sherman Avenue. You may park in the lot at any
 time, whether for church events or for shopping or other errands in downtown Evanston; weekdays, see the
 church office at the Lake St. entrance to get a parking pass. On Sundays, additional parking is available across
 the street at the Holiday Inn or in Lot 6 on Lake St. across from the Police and Fire Headquarters. Parking
 meters are free on Sunday!
- The parking lot entrance is an accessible entrance. An elevator is located just inside that door.
- Restrooms are downstairs near the meeting of the two hallways. Accessible restrooms are located near the
 elevator on both upper and lower levels. A gender-neutral restroom is located on the lower level by the
 elevator.
- We love having children in worship! There is a nursery and changing/crying room for parents to use, if needed, located downstairs. There are also changing tables in both restrooms on this level, by the elevator. An usher will be happy to direct you.
- Hearing assistance is available. Ask an usher for equipment.
- Wi-Fi is available throughout most of the building. The network is "Immanuel," password "allarewelcome". Please use the Internet responsibly!

About Our Worship

Our Sunday worship is organized around the proclamation of the Word of God and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. It has a familiar form each week, but the content changes for each service according to a calendar shared with many other Christians. Our hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, is organized so that page numbers for the liturgy are in the front part of the book, while hymn numbers are in the second part. The liturgy and hymns are printed in this bulletin, but page numbers are provided for those who wish to follow along in the hymnal.

Receiving Holy Communion

We invite you to share with us in the sacramental meal, because Christ himself invites you! At the direction of the usher, come forward if you are able, and stand around the altar, starting at the walls. Receive the bread in the palm of your hand. (Gluten-free wafers are available. Just ask the pastor.) You may eat it immediately, then take the silver chalice and drink from it or, if you prefer, take a small cup from the tray. The cups in the outer ring contain wine. The cups in the center contain grape juice. As you return to your seat place your empty cup in the trays provided at the ends of the front pews. Return to your place via the side aisles after you have communed. If you need to have Communion brought to you, please sit on the aisle, and let either the pastor or an usher know before the service that you would like to commune at your seat. If you desire a blessing but not the sacrament, you are invited to come forward with everyone else and fold your arms over your chest to indicate this.

Gathering: The Holy Spirit assembles us as the People of God ...

In today's gospel the risen Christ ascends into heaven and his followers are assured that the Spirit will empower them to be witnesses throughout the earth. The disciples were told to not gaze up into heaven to look for Jesus; we find his presence among us as we proclaim the word and share the Easter feast. We too long for the Spirit to enliven our faith and invigorate our mission.

Reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Acts 1:1-11

Before he is lifted into heaven, Jesus promises that the missionary work of the disciples will spread out from Jerusalem to all the world. His words provide an outline of the book of Acts.

R A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

[Luke writes:] ¹In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning ²until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. ⁴While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; ⁵for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

⁶So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."



⁵⁰Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. ⁵¹While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. ⁵²And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; ⁵³and they were continually in the temple blessing God.







Matthias, Apostle

Monday, May 14, 2018


Matthias was the apostle added to the Twelve after Jesus' resurrection, as a replacement for the dead Judas Iscariot. He had traveled among the followers of Jesus throughout the Lord's ministry. Formerly commemorated on February 24, Matthias's celebration has been moved to May 14 in agreement with most Western calendars.

Erik, King of Sweden, martyr, d. 1160 Friday, May 18, 2018

Erik is considered the patron saint of Sweden. As king of that nation, he tried to bring peace in the region, and to spread Christianity in Scandinavia. He was also known for his attempts to make fair laws and to protect those who were poor or sick.

A Different Kind of Power

"Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" (Acts 1:6). This is what the disciples are hoping for after all, right? This is what we're going to get after all this suffering and sacrificing and giving our lives away to follow you, Jesus, right? We're finally going to get the best seat at the table, the highest place in court, right? We're finally going to have power over those rotten Romans who have been lording their power over us for all these years, right? Wrong. "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you," Jesus promises (Acts 1:8).

No, the end goal of following Jesus is not to have a better seat than your enemies. But yes, you will be clothed with power. It's just a different kind of power.

Today's scripture readings make clear that there are two kinds of power: power from the top that is used to ensure the lowliness of others and power from the Holy Spirit that is distributed freely to raise up the lowly.

It is this second kind of power that God reveals and enacts in Jesus. Jesus became the lowliest of the low, assumed the position of the despised and outcast, and died a criminal's death. And Jesus was raised to sit at the right hand of God (*Eph. 1:20*). Jesus' ascension is proof of God's choice to use God's power to raise up the lowliest of people.

Each of us was born with power. How do you exercise yours? How does your congregation and community exercise its power? How is God using you to raise up the lowly and clothe others in the power of Holy Spirit? Tell these stories. They witness to the ascended Christ we follow.
