Facilities

- Our parking lot is located on the south side of the church off Sherman Avenue. You may park in the lot at any time, whether for church events or for shopping or other errands in downtown Evanston; weekdays, see the church office at the Lake St. entrance to get a parking pass. On Sundays, additional parking is available across the street at the Holiday Inn or in Lot 6 on Lake St. across from the Police and Fire Headquarters. Parking meters are free on Sunday!
- The parking lot entrance is an accessible entrance. An elevator is located just inside that door.
- Restrooms are downstairs near the meeting of the two hallways. Accessible restrooms are located near the elevator on both upper and lower levels. A gender-neutral restroom is located on the lower level by the elevator.
- We love having children in worship! There is a nursery and changing/crying room for parents to use, if needed, located downstairs. There are also changing tables in both restrooms on this level, by the elevator. An usher will be happy to direct you.
- Hearing assistance is available. Ask an usher for equipment.
- Wi-Fi is available throughout most of the building. The network is "Immanuel," password "allarewelcome". Please use the Internet responsibly!

About Our Worship

Our Sunday worship is organized around the proclamation of the Word of God and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. It has a familiar form each week, but the content changes for each service according to a calendar shared with many other Christians. Our hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, is organized so that page numbers for the liturgy are in the front part of the book, while hymn numbers are in the second part. The liturgy and hymns are printed in this bulletin, but page numbers are provided for those who wish to follow along in the hymnal.

Receiving Holy Communion

We invite you to share with us in the sacramental meal, because Christ himself invites you! At the direction of the usher, come forward if you are able, and kneel at the altar rail, starting at the walls. Receive the bread in the palm of your hand. (Gluten-free wafers are available. Just ask the pastor.) You may eat it immediately, then take the silver chalice and drink from it or, if you prefer, take a small cup from the tray. The cups in the outer ring contain wine. The cups in the center contain grape juice. As you return to your seat, place your empty cup in the trays provided at the ends of the front pews. Return to your place via the side aisles after you have communed. If you need to have Communion brought to you, please sit on the aisle, and let either the pastor or an usher know before the service that you would like to commune at your seat. If you desire a blessing but not the sacrament, you are invited to come forward with everyone else and fold your arms over your chest to indicate this.

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.





Gospel

P This is the Good News of Jesus Christ according to Mark.

A Glory to you, O Lord!

²¹When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side [of the Sea of Galilee], a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. ²²Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet ²³and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." ²⁴So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. ²⁵Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. ²⁶She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. ²⁷She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, ²⁸for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." ²⁹Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. ³⁰Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" ³¹And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" ³²He looked all around to see who had done it. ³³But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. ³⁴He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

³⁵While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" ³⁶But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." ³⁷He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. ³⁸When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. ³⁹When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." ⁴⁰And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. ⁴¹He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" ⁴²And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. ⁴³He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

This Week's Commemorations

Catherine Winkworth, d. 1878; John Mason Neale, d. 1866; hymn translators Sunday, July 1, 2018

Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

Thomas, Apostle

Tuesday, July 3, 2018

Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (*John 11:16*), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" The tradition holds that he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated among Lutherans on December 21, Thomas's celebration was moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.

Jan Hus, martyr, d. 1415

Friday, July 6, 2018

Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. His teachings on indulgences, the Eucharist, and the church had a profound influence on Luther's own teachings. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.

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Stay in Touch

Only a few weeks had passed since his wife's death. Friends invited him to picnic with them "just to get away" from the crowd of loneliness. In their car, he sat beside the driver, the driver's wife in the seat behind. Along the road, somewhere between Heartache and Memory, she cast off her seatbelt, leaned forward, and laid hands on him, one on each shoulder. "I imagine you miss touch" she said.

A prominent man, a father, broke through a crowd. Jairus, he is named, was desperate to get to Jesus for one reason. "My little daughter.... Come and lay your hands on her" (*Mark 5:23*).

The privileged life she once knew had shattered into shards of shame and grief. The future, what she could see of it, looked like an empty well. One Sunday morning, somewhere between Then and Now, away from the crowd of fear, a circle gathered her into its center. They stood around her, a ring of grace, laid hands on her, and prayed.

A left-with-nothing woman, an unclean one, broke through a crowd. She is unnamed, desperate to reach Jesus for one reason. "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well" (*Mark 5:28*).

Touch. Touch the door you close for the last time as you walk away from home. Touch the page of the letter he sent for another moment. Touch the softness of lambs' wool spun for your sweater, the sky-bound prisms of tall grass in the field where you run, the glass between your hand and the prisoner's, the casket dusted with earth, the stone rippled into satin on the shore, the photo, the face, your lover's body, the cotton sheets, the tummy growing your baby, the leper, the bitter women, the dirty men, the wild, the blind, the bowed low, the defeated, the edged out, Jesus. Touch.
