SEPTEMBER 2018 A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...

As I sit in my office, I hear the rumbling of the mighty construction machines across the street. A couple of weeks ago, they tore down Tommy Nevins Pub and Prairie Moon restaurant, buildings that had stood on those spots kitty-corner from Immanuel for many, many decades. The wrecking machines came in and nibbled away at the buildings until they were reduced to a pile of rubble. The salvagers came and bundled up the bricks to haul them away to be used on new projects. And then came the enormous towers they use to drill caissons down into the earth to create a new foundation. As I write this, I hear the beeping of the concrete trucks as they stream onto the site, their sloppy cargo ready to be poured down into the holes so that 16 stories of steel encompassing 275-odd apartment residences can be constructed.

It represents an enormous change to this little corner of downtown Evanston. But I think it also represents an exciting challenge to us as the people of God who gather on the opposite corner week after week to worship God in word and song, and to learn and be equipped as disciples of Jesus.

We might be tempted to bemoan the destruction of something old and familiar to make way for something new that is going to significantly impact our life here. We might grumble about how that huge concrete tower is going to block sunlight, how the residents are going to snap up all the parking spaces in the neighborhood, how the architectural style is going to change the character that this block has had for more than a hundred years.

It's hard to die to things. We all know that. We hate to see the things we've always counted on be torn down, or otherwise disappear. We don't like the thought that things that have been familiar to us will be no more, and that something different will take their place. We don't like the thought that there will be unknown factors in our future that may sometimes have negative effects upon us.

But I think there's an important parable in all this. See, the life of a follower of Jesus is all about dying to the old and rising up to new life. What if, instead of seeing the construction as a problem to be solved or a change to be resisted, we saw it as a sign of a deeper spiritual truth?

What if we looked at that raw construction site and saw it as an opportunity? What if we caught a vision of how we might be able to reach out to hundreds of new neighbors who are suddenly on our doorstep, quite literally? What if as we watch the beams go up we got excited about how God takes things that have died and brings new life out of them?

The way of Jesus is *always* about being ready to die to something so that something new can come. So, what are the ways in which changes like this taking place around us might become for us signs of hope and new life?

What are we ready to do to speak Good News to new neighbors and to others who live nearby in downtown Evanston? Are there things we need to die to? What are the gifts that we have to offer? How can we reach out? What does new life look like here in this place, in this time? What might be the new things that God is calling us to be or to do? Interesting questions to discuss!




In memoriam: Dean Carson and Elizabeth Johnson Todd

We hope you had a wonderful 4th of July and are enjoying the lovely weather. 2017 was a great year for Curt's Café and we want to share some of the highlights with you in our second Annual report, which is enclosed for your review. Our success would not have been possible without your trust in our students and staff and well as your generous support.

Thus far, 2018 has been a productive year for Curt's as well. We celebrated our 6th Anniversary, and hosted the 2nd annual Golf and Tennis fundraiser at the Winnetka Golf Club on June 25th. We also spent much of 2017 cultivating opportunities to serve young adults in the Lake County area. Once we reach our goal to raise \$250,000 Curt's will open its third location! Further, we set out to develop a program tailored specifically for our Graduate Students, who often required additional social services. We are thrilled to share that the program will launch this year.

As you may know, we have trained and mentored over 220 young men and women since we opened our doors in 2012.
