A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...

This past Sunday, we celebrated and blessed in worship the incredible output of quilts produced this year by our Quilting Ministry. The next day, Sara Mauk posted on her Facebook page a photo of the quilts laid out in the sanctuary. Scores of people "liked" the photo, and that was gratifying. I then decided to share Sara's photo on my own Facebook page. Within minutes, the "likes" were piling up. Within hours, more than 130 people had responded positively to the photo on my page. And then people began to share the photo on their own pages. Between Sara's friends and mine, some 35 people posted that photo on their own pages, so we have no idea how many people saw it.

And here's the thing: Over and over, people commented that it was touching to finally see some good news, and to see that people were doing something so beautiful to serve their neighbors. Something in that photo of 158 lovingly stitched and tied quilts, prepared purely for the good of others at the expense of countless hours of labor and many, many dollars' worth of materials, along with the offering of creativity involved, touched something very deep in the people who saw it, most of whom have nothing to do with churches at all in the normal course of their lives.

You see, the things we do to make the lives of others better, the things we do to ease suffering, the things we do to create and share beauty, those are very, very good news for a world that is desperate to hear good news. With all of the horrible and discouraging things that we see in the media every day, people are hungry to know that there is goodness and kindness and beauty in this world.

As followers of Jesus, those are the very things we are commanded to bring about. We are commanded to care for the refugee, the homeless, the marginalized, the poor, the sick, the grieving. And we do these things not only because we're commanded to, but because the love of God in Christ Jesus is poured out into our hearts, and it impels us to love and serve our neighbor.

The word "gospel" means "Good News," and that is what we have to share with others. And that Good News becomes most evident when we are giving of ourselves, our time, our talents, and our treasure to bring about healing, wholeness, mercy, and love in a world that longs for those things.

Sometimes, spreading the Good News of Jesus is as simple as showing people the things that Jesus' love prompts us to do to serve others. One simple photo, showing a great labor of love, is now rippling through the Internet, announcing to people that the love of Jesus is real, and that there is Good News to be heard. People really are longing for it. Let's show them!


All Saints Sunday, Nov. 4


All Saints will be observed on Sunday, Nov. 4, at our 10:30 worship.

This is a beautiful time of remembrance and thanksgiving, and a great service to invite friends and family to attend.





A terrific potluck lunch was shared, followed by a "blessing of the hands" conducted by clergy from all the parishes. People also wrote post cards and letters to advocate for justice issues, and brought in items for hygiene kits for homeless folks.

Our gathering is rather unique in that it brings together Lutherans and Catholics. Thanks be to God for all the willing hands, and for the witness this gives to our community!
























Quilt Blessing Sunday, September 30

On Sunday, Sept. 30 we had the Blessing of the Quilts. This year the number of finished quilts was 158! There were 18 quilters who were very regular in coming and 4-6 friends/ associates who came occasionally. We thank God for their loving talents and gifts!

After the blessing we packed the quilts into 26 boxes. Now, these boxes need to be dropped off at Messiah Lutheran Church, 1605 Vernon (1 block southwest of Lutheran General Hospital), **Park Ridge** (847-823-6984), where they'll be loaded onto a semi trailer. Eventually they're transported to the Lutheran World Relief warehouse.

Drop-off times at Messiah Lutheran are Saturday, 10/6, 9 AM–12 noon, and Sunday, 10/7, 9 AM –3 PM. If you are able to transport any of these boxes to Park Ridge, please let Chris Djuric know.

On Sunday, Sept. 30, we began a new study of the Gospel of Mark. We'll read our way across the shortest of the gospels over a period of several weeks. We'll be considering what the narrative tells us about what the writer of Mark considers important, the themes that are developed, and how the characters are portrayed, and what that tells us about how this gospel understands the life and work of Jesus...and what the implications are for us as we live our lives as followers of Jesus. This won't be all about "head" understanding, but "heart" understanding, as well.

An outline of the course with readings is available, along with a schedule of the classes. If you've wanted to learn more about the Bible, the Gospel of Mark is one of the most accessible of all the books in scripture. Our discussions will be freewheeling and helpful. Building Masonry Work



The masons repaired several bays on the church and both the replacement brick and the mortar match well.

They worked on the parish house entrance and removed the bricks above the decorative limestone lintel and exposed the steel lintel that supports it. They ground the rust from the steel lintel and given it rust seal paint and a rubber coating; also, they had additional support bolts to the cracked limestone lintel on the right to give it proper support. The steel was covered with a waterproof membrane flashing to discourage any additional damage from above.

They removed the limestone coping at the top of the entrance way and adding waterproof flashing beneath it and filling the joins between the coping with caulk rather than


mortar for better water sealing and longer life. The hidden pitched copper roof above the entrance is in good shape.

Metro-Chicago Synodical Women's Organization 2018 Convention

Take part in this year's Synodical Women's Organization (SWO) annual convention on Saturday, **October 27, 2018**, from 8:30 AM–3:30 PM at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, 27 South Edgelawn Drive, Aurora, IL 60506. Registration is \$30 (or \$35 on day of event). Mail registration with payment by **October 20** to Sandie Schlauch, 7803 Palma Lane, Morton Grove, IL 60053.

The event theme is *Radical Hospitality*. SWO President Linda Miranda recently noted that if today's news has made you want to step up and get involved in helping the refugee population, especially children, this is a convention for you. The keynote speaker is Jose Garza, Executive Director of the Workers Defense Project in Austin, Texas. He has extensive experience working with local, state and national labor organiza-



tions and has devoted his career to the fight for opportunities for working and immigrant families.

Breakout sessions will be presented by representatives from the ELCA's strategy to Accompany Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO); from RefugeeOne, the largest resettlement agency in Illinois; and from in-Faith Community Foundation, an organization which works with donors to make the most of each gift and deliver charitable support to their shared community.

There will be an opportunity to learn about other ministries and shop at vendors in the display area. A portion of the convention offering will be given to both AMMPARO and RefugeeOne. Participants are encouraged to bring in-kind donations of diapers, baby wipes, toothbrushes, travel size toothpaste, baby bottles, facial tissues, ibuprofen or tampons which will be given to Hesed House in Aurora, the second largest homeless center outside of the city of Chicago.
