A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...

"Shaken, AND stirred!"

Each Sunday in the Advent season, year after year, the Prayer of the Day begins with a plea to God to stir things up. The first Sunday of Advent, the plea is "Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come!" The second week, it is "Stir up our hearts, Lord God, to prepare the way of your only Son." Week three, it is "Stir up the wills of all who look to you, Lord God." In the final week, the prayer is once again, "Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come."

Do we really want God to stir things up, though? Maybe we do, maybe we don't. It's really kind of a scary thing to pray, when you think about it. To pray that Christ's power will be stirred up and unleashed on the world is to pray that things will cease to be as they are now, which is for many of us a profoundly uncomfortable prospect, as much as we might complain about the way things are. When we pray for Christ's power to be stirred up, we are praying for an end to the ways of the world as we know it. We are praying for a Reign of God to come breaking in that will shake and tumble the certainties and current realities that we've built our lives upon.

To pray that our own hearts will be stirred is to pray that somehow Christ will move and change us to become willing participants in the shaking up of things. It is to open ourselves to the possibility that God will use us for the shaking. Are you ready for that possibility?

To pray that our wills will be stirred is to yield up to God that thing we hold most dear, our ability to call the shots. To pray that our wills will be stirred is to acknowledge that changed hearts are not enough...a will that has been changed implies that we will move from thought and feeling into action and begin to bear fruit. And that requires not only that we give up being in control, but that we also make ourselves available for God's use in stirring things up.

How is God wanting to stir you up in the coming year? How might God be wanting to stir things up at Immanuel? What are the things we could be doing to shake up the world around us?

When God became Immanuel—"God with us"—God started stirring up a kind of power the world had never seen before, a power based in love, a power based in service to others. Each week during Advent we pray for that stirring to move our world, to move our hearts, to move out bodies, to become part of God's great stirring up of power.

My prayer for you this Advent season is that Christ's power will stir you, heart, will, and body, and that you will open yourself to becoming part of God's great stirring and shaking here at Immanuel.

On Advent 2, the choir will offer a rousing rendition of "Veni Emmanuel" set by Hungarian composer Zoltán Kodály.

We remember to rejoice on Advent 3 with "Rejoice in the Lord Alway" and finish the season for Advent 4 with a final plea of "Now Come, Redeemer Of Us All" by Michael Praetorius.

On Christmas Eve we will be joined by the riveting soprano, Ashlee Hardgrave, who will also join the choir for the anthems by Orlando Gibbons ("Christmas Day") and a Mark Schweizer arrangement of "O


Little Town of Bethlehem." We will round out the year with a rousing Lessons and Carols on December 30th.

Interfaith Action of Evanston Job Posting

Interfaith Action of Evanston is hiring **Overnight Supervisor** positions for its Emergency Overnight Shelter.

Overnight supervisor duties at the Emergency Overnight Shelter

The Emergency Overnight Shelter will be open in December, January and February whenever the temperature falls to 20 degrees or below or there is significant moisture. The supervisor will be notified each morning by 8 am on the status of opening and the location of the shelter. Six different faith communities in the downtown Evanston area have donated their space.

The supervisor commits to 3 to 5 consistent nights each week. He/she will be paid \$180 for each night he works.

The number one responsibility of the supervisor is to maintain order and ensure the safety of our volunteers and our guests. The supervisor will have a cell phone to use to contact the Executive Director or to call 911.

The supervisor unlocks the door at 8:00 pm. Volunteers will arrive at 8 and they will set up the cots and make the coffee.

The supervisor opens the door at 9:00 pm for guests. Volunteers will stay to help pass out sheets and blankets. Guests will find their cot and may go to bed or have a hot drink. An overnight volunteer will arrive between 9:00 pm and 10:00 pm. The doors are locked at 10:00 pm and guests are no longer able to enter (unless they are brought by police). There will be cots so staff and volunteer can sleep!

The supervisor wakes up guests at 6:15 am. Volunteers will arrive to help clean up. Guests leave by 6:45 to go to Hospitality Center for breakfast. He/she supervises volunteers as they clean up. This may include emptying the trash, bagging the laundry, cleaning the kitchen area, turn out lights, and possibly putting the cots away. The major cleaning is done by the maintenance person.

You should be able to lock up and leave by 7 am.
