A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...

I love this time of year! Partly because of the change in weather, the change of the leaves, all those feelings associated with the rolling of the seasons...but also because of the change in rhythm. Summer tends to be a “sleepy” time. Many of our church activities go on hiatus. The hallways are quiet because the Thin Ice theater kids aren’t around for their classes, the Wilmette Community Band folks aren’t coming for their rehearsals, Café Immanuel takes a breather, the Choir takes a much deserved break, and the Market has moved outdoors.

So when this season rolls around, it suddenly feels like this huge infusion of life-giving energy surges back in. Our worship gets that extra “oomph” from the gifts our Choir offers, along with the presence of so many people who are back from travels. Our ministries pick back up. All in all, things just seem to move. Change seems to be in the air.

“Change” is a word that many folks are uncomfortable with. In my previous congregation, I once had a couple of people come to me privately to ask me to stop using the word “change” so often, because it made them anxious. One dear brother suggested that I use the word “transformation” because it didn’t make him feel so uncomfortable.

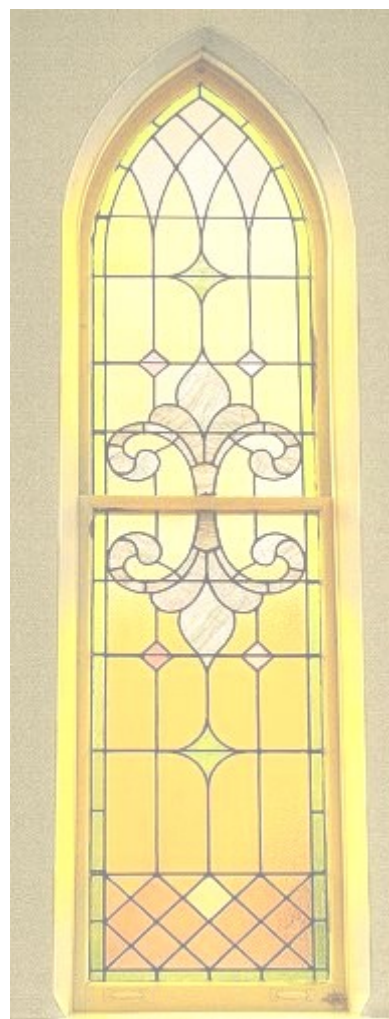
But whether we use the word “change” or “transformation,” that idea that things simply don’t stay the way they are lies at the very heart of the Christian understanding of the world. Yes, things roll back around, and there are many things that are predictable and steady. But in its essence, the way of Jesus is a way of transformation, a way of change. God from the beginning has been creating, and whether we like it or not, even the things we consider to be the most rock-solid are somehow being made new, being transformed, being changed.

It may seem ironic that I get excited about change in a period of the year when leaves begin to die and drop from the trees, and when there’s a hint of winter in the air. But you see, that’s also a notion that lies at the heart of Christian worldview: New life never comes without dying to something so that something new can come in its place. Jesus said that unless a seed falls into the ground and dies, it will never bear fruit that will lead to many seeds. The mystery Jesus teaches us that it is in dying and rising that we find new life. This is the mystery he demonstrated with his own dying and rising.

As a congregation, we must be ever ready to enter into this rhythm of change, this rhythm of dying and rising and dying and rising. As Jesus taught us, we are to look at the ends of the branches that lose their leaves, because it is there that we will see the buds that will bring new leaves and fruit in due season.

Change and new energy are God’s own promise, and not something to ever be afraid of. God’s faithfulness is sure and certain, and God invites us into renewal and change as we become co-creators with God.

MUSIC AT IMMANUEL

We have finished an exciting month back with a full choir. We kicked off the fall on God's Work Our Hands Sunday with "Have you Heard God's Voice?" by Frederick Chatfield, followed by Laura Lea Duckworth's composition "The Ninety and Nine" about the lost sheep. We finished September with a lovely standard motet "O Lord, Increase My Faith," attributed to Orlando Gibbons, and a Moses Hogan arrangement of "Lord, I Want to Be a Christian."

October will begin with Beverly Easterling's Communion anthem "And With This Bread." We continue with "How Can I Keep from Singing?" set by Mark Schweitzer, and Allen Pote's setting of Psalm 121 "I Lift Up Mine Eyes." We will conclude the month with our annual celebration of Reformation joined by St. Paul's choir and two violinists and a cellist. Our robust combined forces will offer Johan Roman's setting of Psalm 46 "God Is Our Refuge" during worship as well as Dietrich Buxtehude's work "Lord Keep Us Steadfast In Your Word."

Many thanks to all who came out on Sunday, Sept. 8, for a most successful "God's Work Our Hands" day of service. Thanks also to those who organized it!

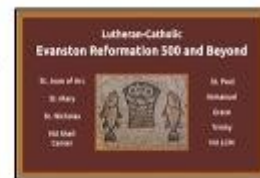

Represented were the following congregations: Immanuel, Grace Lutheran, Trinity Lutheran, St. Paul's Lutheran, St. Nicholas Roman Catholic, Sheil Catholic Center at Northwestern University, and St. Mary Roman Catholic.

A terrific potluck lunch was shared, followed by a "blessing and anointing of the hands" conducted by clergy from all the parishes. Then people started on these projects: Quilt-tying for Lutheran World Relief, Advocacy card writing for justice issues, making "get well" and other greeting cards, making bag lunches for Connections for the Homeless, and assembling hygiene kits for guests at the St. Paul soup kitchen and "Back on Your Feet." Also, there were projects done at locations other than Immanuel, such as: Fall clean-up at Lutheran Campus Ministry at Northwestern University, painting at new location of Moran Youth Services (1900 Dempster), and cleaning and organizing at the YMCA and YWCA.

Our gathering is rather unique in that it brings together Lutherans and Catholics. Thanks be to God for all the willing hands, and for the witness this gives to our community!

Bishop-elect Yehiel Curry, who was elected bishop of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod, ELCA, on June 8, 2019, will be installed as bishop on Saturday, October 19, 2019, at 2 p.m. at the Tinley Park Convention Center, 18451 Convention Center Dr., Tinley Park, IL 60477. A reception will follow. His six-year term began on September 1, 2019.

The bishop served as pastor of Shekinah Chapel Lutheran Church in Riverdale since 2013, and as mission developer of Shekinah from 2007 to 2012. Curry received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., in 1995, and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago in 2013. 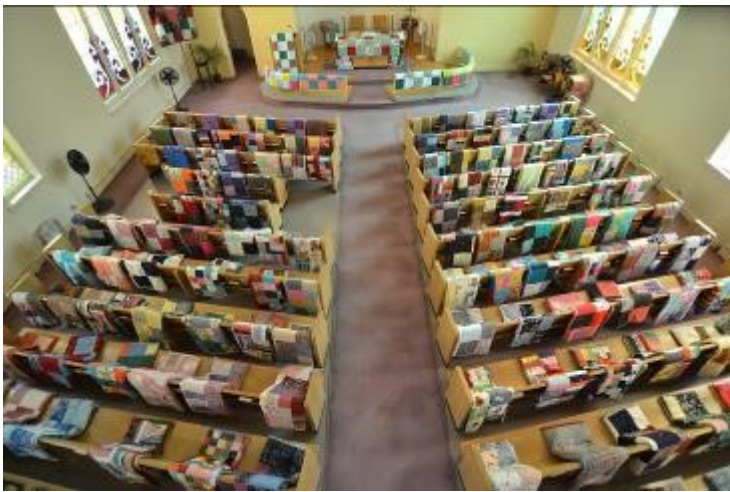
ELCA Good Gifts: Brand-new gifts, Cards and Online Store

BREAKING BREAD, ERADICATING HATE

— from *Stories of Faith in Action*

Much can happen when we gather for a meal—new understandings, new commitments, new friendships.

In May 2018, several ELCA congregations and worshipping communities discovered this when they joined their Muslim neighbors for Interfaith *iftars*. An *iftar* is the evening meal at which Muslims break their daily fast during the holy month of Ramadan.

Augustana Lutheran, Sioux Falls, SD, and the mission congregation it shares building space with, *Pueblo de Dios*, hosted their first *iftar*. Almost 60 people attended, including members of Augustana Lutheran and *Pueblo de Dios* and Muslims from three mosques in town.

“There was a bit of discomfort on both sides—Christian and Muslim,” said the Rev. Amy Martinell, Augustana’s pastor. But “When the food came out and we sat and ate together, the discomfort melted away and we became one community.”

For two years the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) hosted regular *iftars* with a nearby Turkish community. Sara Trumm, interim director of A Center of Christian–Muslim Engagement for Peace and Justice at LSTC, reported that 60–100 people attended. Trumm said they’ve found that sharing a meal helps people feel comfortable meeting others from different backgrounds.

“Right now, with Islamophobia as strong as it is, it’s important for people to be informed about what Islam is so they don’t fall prey to some of the negative stereotyping and falsities being shared, especially with one of the Ten Commandments telling us not to bear false witness against our neighbors,” she said.

To promote the interfaith *iftars*, Neighbors in Faith, a joint ministry of the Northwest Washington Synod of the ELCA, the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia, and Washington’s Muslim community, worked with Shoulder-to-Shoulder, an interreligious campaign dedicated to ending anti-Muslim sentiment. The ELCA is a founding member of Shoulder-to-Shoulder, which receives mission support funding from the ELCA.

“What actually changes for people who are rooted in fear is to meet a Muslim and realize they’re just human, too,” said Terry Kylo, an ELCA pastor and the Director of Neighbors in Faith. “The *iftars* are a beautiful way to begin to understand the basics of Islam and how many similarities we have. And they help our Muslim neighbors to see that they aren’t alone, that we want to learn from them and are willing to stand in solidarity with them.”

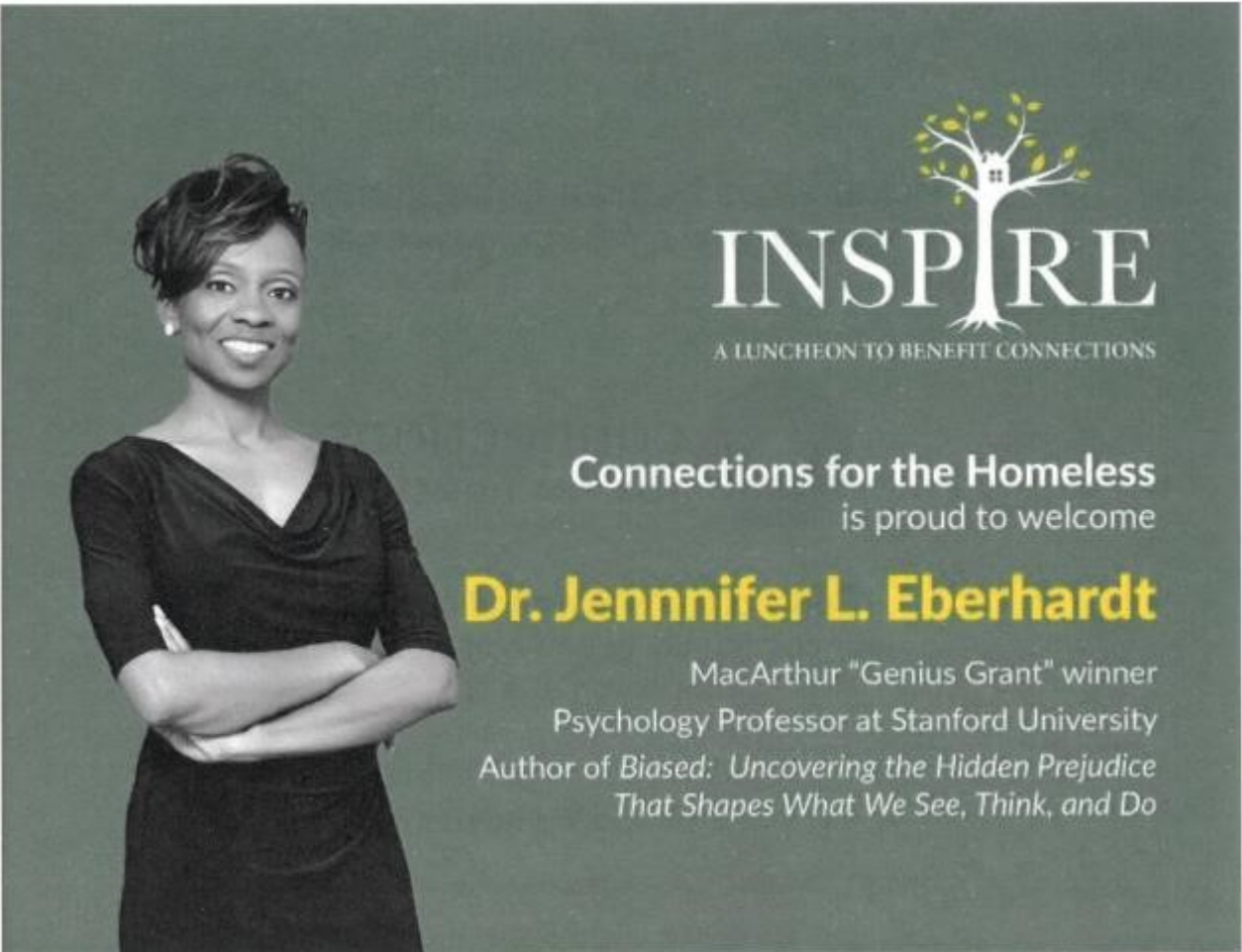

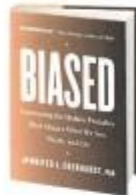

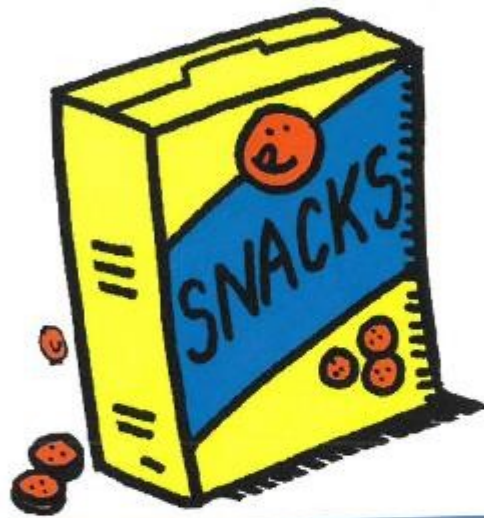
