A WORD FROM PASTOR KEITH...

"We are awaiting the coming of Jesus, yearning in darkness for light and for peace, longing at last to rejoice on that day when all people join in that feast.

Those are the words we'll be singing each Sunday morning in Advent as our gifts are brought forward, both the gifts of our financial resources and the gifts of bread and wine, brought forth from the earth and from the work of human hands as a holy offering to God for the good of all.

There's something about this time of year that always makes both my body and mind want to slumber. Maybe it's the cold in the air that makes me huddle in on myself and just find a warm place to lie down and sleep. Maybe it's the darkness that slowly starts gathering at 3:00 in the afternoon, so that by 4:30 it's already dark. Whatever it is, my hibernation instincts kick in.

But it's precisely at this point in the year that we hear the cry to "wake up!" It's precisely at this time that we're told to rouse ourselves from slumber and to peer out into the darkness of our world to see the signs of dawn, to look for the buds of the promised spring.

It is at this moment in the year that we are reminded insistently by the scripture readings and songs we hear in worship that we are awaiting the coming of Jesus, the coming of that great day when all people will join together in a feast of fellowship and peace.

When we gather for work and worship, when we gather around the Lord's Table, we are playing out that longed-for reality, practicing it for the time when all people will enjoy the fruits of the earth's bounty and the blessings of peace. When we gather for the Farmers' Market, we support struggling small farmers and vendors, we support care for the earth, and we share from that bounty with those who struggle to find enough to eat through our grants to hunger organizations.

When we piece together quilts to be sent to people in distress around the globe, we are practicing the hospitality of the promised feast. When we serve breakfast at Café Immanuel, and sit down beside a person who is homeless and share a meal and conversation with them, we are practicing the fellowship of the great and promised banquet.

And now, on Friday afternoons, when we open our doors as a Warming Center for folks who need a place to come in and find a warm welcome, warm beverages, and a warm place to just sit or to doze for awhile, we are living out the vision of the feast where all have a place.

In Advent, in the darkest hour of the year, we hear the call to wake up, to rouse ourselves from slumber, and to shine the light of Christ into the darkness. We are awaiting the coming of the Bridegroom, the presence of God's own self, the full realization of the feast we've been practicing for so long.

Yes, we are awaiting the coming of Jesus. But we don't have to wait. We can practice the feast here and now. Let's bring our gifts. There's a banquet to prepare!

MUSIC AT IMMANUEL

Music in December

Happy New Church year as we prepare for Christ's birth most of the month of December. We will be returning to the more somber and penitential liturgical Setting 5 during this season.

The choir will begin with a new setting of the familiar Advent text "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus" by Daniel Gawthrop. Advent 2 will sprout a Hugo Distler setting of "Lo How a Rose e'er Blooming." The pink Sunday of Advent 3. the choir will offer "The Yearning" by Craig Courtney.

We will close the season with Pr. Royce Scharf's hymn "The Hills Are Bare at Bethlehem" arranged by Richard Wienhorst. (Pr. Scharf was a much-loved pastor of Immanuel a number of years ago, and he and his wife were hymn writers.) Christmas Eve will welcome soprano Ashlee Hardgrave back again as the choir offers a setting of "Infant Holy, Infant Lowly" by Andrew Risinger and a chant-based anthem "Dost Thou in a Manger Lie" by Martha Jones Burford. We will close the month and year of 2019 with a joy-filled Lessons and Carols.



SOCIAL MINISTRY-Immanuel's Warming Center: Update

As of November 15th, Immanuel now provides a place to stay warm and safe for Evanston's homeless community every Friday afternoon (from November through March). We thus become part of the city-wide network of warming centers and soup kitchens coordinated by Interfaith Action of Evanston. Other congregations involved in this ministry are Beth Emet Synagogue, Bethany Baptist, First Congregational, First Presbyterian, First United Methodist, Lake Street Church, Second Baptist, St. Mary's Catholic, St. Mark's Episcopal, St. Paul's Lutheran, and the Unitarian Church.

The network has been in place for several years. Last winter we learned that there was a need for a host congregation on Friday afternoons, and after much conversation and planning, Immanuel agreed to take on this ministry.

On our first day, Immanuel's volunteers were ready with hot drinks, snacks, and a stack of sleeping mats. Beginning at 2:00 P.M., we welcomed ten guests from the cold outdoors into the warmth of Fellowship Hall. Some of the guests sat at tables, but most found a space on the floor where they placed one of the mats alongside their belongings and slept for most of the three-hour time slot. All of the guests were ready to leave by 5:00. Many of them expressed their gratitude for the congregation's welcome as they departed.

Three volunteers are needed for each Friday through March. Volunteers should arrive early to prepare coffee and get things in place, and then stay for a short while afterward to straighten up. The leader of this ministry is Nicolai Schousboe. See him to find an available time if you'd like to volunteer your help. We can also use contributions toward snacks and drinks. —Stephen Warner

CPR AND FIRST AID TRAINING AT IMMANUEL

The Congregation Council is looking at providing an opportunity for members to be trained in the following:

- -CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation)
- -Heimlich Maneuver (for responding to choking persons)
- -Use of an AED (Automated External Defibrillator)

The purpose is to equip members of the congregation who are regular attendees of worship and church events with the necessary training to be able to respond in the event of a medical emergency. 


