

A WORD FROM PASTOR KIM....

Some years ago a colleague's phone call interrupted a quiet day in the office. I'm sure I brightened at the sound of his voice – there was always good energy there. But I was glad it wasn't zoom, and he couldn't see my face on the other end of the phone line when he said he was calling to tell me he'd accepted a call to another synod.

I wished him well, of course. As soon as I was able to speak again, I was able to summon up a faith frame to let him know how much I had valued his neighborly presence in my life, understood it wasn't going to be like that anymore, and could both rejoice in the past and let it go because of the nature of our relationship in Christ.


I think I put it like this: that in the body of Christ we are called to love one another deeply, but loosely. The nature of our work in this body plunges us deeply into things that matter, usually quite quickly, basing our relationships and bonds in those deep-down experiences.



We can do that because we know that near or far, in life or in death, the communion of saints keeps us one in the body. Holds us close in love and blessed memory. That doesn't mean we don't gulp hard, sigh, cry bitter and agonized tears, or scream and yell when the faces and voices that have brought life and energy into our lives are no longer available on a daily basis. Especially in these days when not just calls to new ministries, but when death, and covid, may part us so wrenchingly. But it does give us something to cling to, a frame of faith to bring comfort, joy, the restoration of trust, and meaning to this letting go... a fact of life in the Body.

I've been reflecting again on this "deeply but loosely" loving way of life in the past few months as so much of what we have counted on and sometimes taken for granted in life is challenged and in coming to Immanuel as your interim pastor. Since interim pastors are not eligible to be considered for the permanent call it's an opportunity for both you and I to practice loving deeply, but loosely. The way I've been thinking about it lately is being immediately and fully involved, deeply engaged in this present, but only loosely attached to the future which God is unfolding! I hope we can practice this way of life in these next months as God seems to be doing something new with the church, and as rehearsal for your deep and loving welcome of your next settled Servant-in-Christ, and even for his or her eventual news of departure.

This a good skill to develop in ALL these interim and transitional days, as the Holy Spirit is always mixing it up, keeping us loose, and sending us, in the promise that the ties that bind us are faith's assurance of being held tightly in God together forever.

MINISTRY SITE PROFILE UPDATE

Congregational Survey Completed

Charly Yarnoff and I were commissioned by the Ministry Site Profile Task Force to design and implement a survey of the congregation to help answer questions of who we are and what we're looking for in a new pastor. These are the questions the Ministry Site Profile addresses.

For this purpose, we edited the survey conducted in 2013-2014, when Immanuel was in the interim between Prs. Frank Senn and Keith Fry. Both surveys used resources of the Hartford Institute for Religion Research and were made available on Survey Monkey. The current survey was launched on Thursday, April 2, to a list of 113 members and friends of Immanuel and concluded on Monday, April 27, with 72 respondents, for a rate of return of 64%. In the business of church surveys, that is a very respectable rate of return. Thanks to all who took part in the survey.

The survey data were made available to me on Tuesday, April 28, but the Task Force has not yet had time to digest them. Nonetheless, insofar as the respondents to the two surveys

fairly represent the congregation in these two years, 2014 and 2020, we can say a few things about changes in the make-up of the congregation and people's involvement in the church. Compared to 6 years ago, we have fewer very old (75+) and young (under 35), and more middle-aged people; fewer retired and more full-time employed; proportionately more married couples and fewer single persons; proportionately more people new to Evanston and new to the church; and even more people with post-graduate education (54% vs. 43%). These are small changes, and I doubt that many of you would find them surprising.

What is more interesting to me, at least, are changes in levels of involvement. There are slight upticks in the proportion reporting that they attend worship every week (51% compared to 44%) and that they are members of one or more church committees or groups (78% vs. 72%). These figures are consistent with the Task Force's perception that, although our membership is smaller, the members are more involved, or, colloquially, we're leaner as a congregation but more fit. The question we asked about respondents' sense of Immanuel's identity and vision yielded especially striking changes along these lines. To the question, "It is easy for me to tell my friends what is unique about Immanuel," 54% strongly agreed in 2020, compared to 30% in 2014. To the question, "Immanuel's identity is one with which I feel comfortable," 63% strongly agreed in 2020, compared to 32% in 2014. To the question, "I have a strong sense of belonging to the congregation," 58% strongly agreed in 2020 compared to 44% in 2014.

There is much more information to be gleaned from the survey about us and our vision that will be of use to the Task Force and the eventual call committee. But for now, it's clear that morale is high.

It's been difficult putting Immanuel's rich ministries to the community on hiatus during shelter in place orders. In a meeting of the Evanston ministerial group, we reviewed a few organizations that are doing work and where volunteering, or doing planning on online meetings, for those most affected or under-resourced for shelter in place are being accomplished.

As you may imagine, it is difficult to shelter in place and wash hands frequently and maintain social distance if you are without a home. During this crisis, many of those without homes in Evanston have been temporarily housed in hotel rooms and also received meals there. The organization is meeting to consider how our neighbors can be assisted once shelter in place is over and this type of housing is no longer available. If you are interested in being part of this work, the website offers some ways to connect, as well as to donate if you are able to do so at this time.

We hope that soon Immanuel's own ministries can be up and running. In the meantime, any connections to other community organizations that can be deepened at this time, will strengthen our relationships and care for our neighbors in the time to come!

It was fun to observe, and I want to thank each of the people involved with this effort. As council receives the MSP, we can now also start to work appointing members of a Call Committee. Watch for news from me on this in the near future, as we will definitely want to get congregational input in thinking about the composition of this important committee.

Finally, I want to thank the members of the Worship Committee and our musicians Jimmy and Greg for all they have done to make worship so meaningful during this period of separation. I find it so encouraging that our worship is live and involves so many in our community. Sara, Jimmy, Greg, the choir, and many others have worked so hard to make this happen, and have added many enhancements over time. I also want to thank everyone who has joined us for worship; I know the new online platform has required each of us to stretch our computer skills a bit, and I am grateful for that. It is so wonderful to be able to see so many live faces each Sunday morning, and this worship experience really speaks to the strength and vitality of our community.

INVITATION TO MAKE MASKS....

Immanuel member Audrey Moy is available to assist by picking up your masks and delivering them to the coordinators of Stand for Children. Please contact her if you need a mask pick-up.



The communities of color on the South Side of Chicago are among the hardest hit by the coronavirus pandemic. You can help save lives by making cloth face masks. Stand for Children will send your masks directly to families who live in these neighborhoods. Here's how you can stand with the South Side.

- Follow the instructions below for masking masks.
 (There are versions for those handy with sewing machines and those who are not.)
- Please wear your own mask and make sure your hands are <u>clean</u> when you make masks.
- Package each mask individually in a new, resealable Ziploc-type bag.
- Put the masks in the plastic box on porch of the Rodman's home at 1709 Forest Avenue in Wilmette (yellow house). If you need to mail or have masks picked up, let us know.
- Stand for Children will be mailing masks throughout the Spring. The sooner you donate masks, the sooner they'll reach families. We'll accept a few, or as many as you have, at a time.
- Post a picture on f and f of you making and wearing masks using #Stand4ChildrenMasks.

Instructions are <u>here</u>. (See "For Those Who Sew.") However, if you are using another pattern for making cloth masks with a sewing machine, we will gladly accept them as long as they are clean and high quality.




For each mask, you need:

- A clean piece of cotton fabric that measures about 12 inches by 21 inches. Bandanas, t-shirts, pillowcases, and dress shirts are good options. Each bandana is large enough to make two masks.
- Two pieces of cloth ribbon, each cut about 21 inches long. Ribbon that is about ½ inch wide works well
 but so do unused shoelaces. The key is something longer that will loop comfortably around the ears and
 can be untied to adjust for fit. One cloth ribbon option is here.
- A bit of needle and thread (you'll only be sewing a few stitches) OR no-sew permanent fabric glue.
- Ruler and scissors.
- Small Ziploc or other brand of resealable plastic bag.




STEP 1. Flatten the clean piece of cotton fabric on a table in front of you as if it were a placemat. Fold the fabric on its long edges into half so that it is now about 7 or 8 inches tall.



STEP 2. To start making ear loops, lay the two ribbon pieces vertically across the fabric at one-third and two-thirds of the way across the fabric.



STEP 3. Fold the left end of the fabric across **to meet the ribbon** on the right side. Then fold the right end of the fabric over to the left edge of the fabric.



STEP 4. Make three simple stitches on the left edge (or use dabs of fabric glue). The blue tape shows where to do this. Do not sew through the ribbon. If using fabric glue, let it dry completely.





STEP 5. Tie the ends of each ribbon securely but not terribly tight because the wearer will adjust the ribbon so the mask fits onto their face snugly. Place the mask in a small resealable plastic bag and seal it.


Notes from the Parish Administrator

Realm Accounts & Profile Updates, Including a Photo

By now all members should have received an email invitation or reminder about setting up their accounts and/or updating their Member Profiles on Realm, the church member database. You might have gotten an invitation initially when Immanuel members were entered into the database in 2017. If your link has expired, please let me know at parishadmin@ilcevanston.org, and I can send you a new link. Also check your Spam or Junk folders in case your email system doesn't recognize the Realm Sender.



Current and updated Realm Profiles will give us yet another tool to keep in touch during the suspension of in-person activities. The information is accessible only to members who have an active account. Please review your profile carefully, make updates as needed and *be sure to answer every question*.



Additionally, if you have a photo, please try to upload your photo to your Profile picture spot. As Scott Romans noted in his message, when our new Pastor joins us, undoubtedly they will look to Realm as an important resource to get to know the congregation. Having a photo with a name will be a huge help! (I wish I'd thought of this when I first joined Immanuel, too!) And if you're not sure how to upload your photo, you can send it to me at parish-admin@ilcevanston.org, and I can upload it to your profile for you.

Photography Policy of Immanuel Members

GETMEPPECHI—COLLECTING MEDICAL SUPPLIES

GetMePPEChi is a grassroots organization comprised of medical students, health professionals and volunteers from Northwestern University, University of Illinois at Chicago, Rush, Loyola, Rosalind Franklin, University of Chicago, and Midwestern University. We are working to support front line medical providers fighting COVID. Our mission is to provide personal protective equipment (PPE) for hospitals in need. Without adequate N95 Respirators and other PPE, healthcare professionals will get sick. They will get other healthcare professionals sick. There will be nobody to care for patients. You wouldn't send a soldier into battle without armor. Why are we sending our doctors into an infectious environment without adequate protection? We must do better.

I'm reaching out to you to ask if you, your friends or company has any supply of N95 or other particulate filter masks, face shields, gloves, safety goggles, coveralls, dust/surgical masks, or other protective equipment you would be willing to donate. We are collecting materials to allocate to local hospitals that the Illinois Department of Public Health deems most in need. Many hospitals have already declared critical shortages and have emergency room staff wearing makeshift equipment to care for critically ill patients. Our hospital staff need this protective gear to properly care for all patients, minimize the risk of spread, and protect themselves to prevent a shortage of medical personnel.
