

Inscription – The Chalking of the Door

Following an eastern European tradition, a visual blessing may be inscribed with white chalk above the main door

20+CMB+21

The numbers change with each new year. The three letters stand for either the ancient Latin blessing Christe mansionem benedicat, which means, "Christ, bless this house," or the legendary names of the magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar). The sign of the cross is made.

The inscriptions will be made as leaders and assembly recite the blessing. What is the way you will "mark" the doorway to our zoom assembly?



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Affirmation of Baptism

Dear friends, as we gather at the river remembering Jesus' baptism we give thanks for and remember the gift of our baptisms into Christ.

You have called us to yourself, enlightened us with the gifts of your Spirit, and nourished us in the community of faith. As we celebrate the new year, and live into our congregation's calling as we take steps to call a new pastoral leader, uphold us and all your servants in the gifts and promises of baptism, and unite the hearts of all whom you have brought to new birth. We ask this in the name of Christ. **Amen.**

PROFESSION OF FAITH

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

I renounce them.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

You led your people through the river Jordon and called them to life in covenant.

Your Son was baptized in the river Jordan to begin his mission among us.

Through this water remind us of our baptism.

Create us all anew that we may serve this needy world.

Stir up in us the gift of your Holy Spirit:

the spirit of wisdom and understanding,

the spirit of counsel and might,

the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord,

the spirit of joy in your presence both now and forever. Amen.
