Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

As summer winds down and the trees turn colors and begin to lose leaves, I wonder how our lives will change this season. What do we need to let go of? What do we need to grieve? I was



struck by the simple, yet profound, assertion that Ann Lamott makes in her book, *Small Victories*, that grieving is the only way to heal grief. Since it's uncomfortable, our natural tendency is to avoid it, yet it's only by embracing our sadness and heartache that we may experience a cathartic release and a new place of peace as we enter our sadness and maybe even let tears flow. Whenever we hold back or avoid our grieving, we inhibit ourselves from fully experiencing the abundant life that Jesus came to bring.

As the Covid-19 pandemic continues to put constraints on how we live, our whole society grieves the loss of connection that comes through handshakes and touch and the loss of a unified effort to inhibit spread of the virus through masking and vaccinations. One of the benefits of belonging to a congregational community is in having friends in Christ in which to share our life journeys. Here we find traveling companions through our sorrows and our joys. As Henri Nouwen once observed: We need friends. Friends guide us, care for us, confront us in love, console us in times of pain.... The more able we are to receive the different gifts our friends have to give us, the more able we will be to offer our own unique but limited gifts. Thus, friendships create a beautiful tapestry of love.

In community we journey together through the many seasons of our lives letting go of what we need to let go of in order that new shoots of learning and insight might emerge. Just as the trees lose their leaves, we can let go of whatever keeps us from being our most whole and true selves. We can dredge out the clogged gutters that inhibit God's love from freely flowing through us. We can participate in communal activities that support and assist others on their journey, while simultaneously providing the sustenance we need for our own.

Starting on September 19th we'll have an opportunity on Sunday mornings (9 am -10 am) before worship to gather and share our journeys in a hybrid format, either in person or online. We will gather as the body of Christ to dive deeper into what it means to live out our faith. I believe that our faith formation happens in and through trusted relationships, and that faith is more often caught than taught. We discover from one another how to give ourselves away in loving service to the world and we reap rich blessings in doing so. The planned format will be to watch a brief video clip to prime the pump of our discussion on various topics. You'll find a planned schedule of topics in this newsletter. The Zoom link for those who desire to be present from home will be on our website and in the weekly *Newsfeed*. I'm excited to journey with you on this adventure of faith. And I trust the Spirit to be our guide.




SAVE THE DATE for a three-part workshop on <u>Faith</u>, <u>Justice and Reparations in Evanston</u>. Sessions will take place on <u>Sunday afternoons 4:00 pm - 5:30 pm on September 19th</u>, <u>September 26th</u>, and <u>October 3rd</u>, on Zoom.

We will explore what "reparation" means, how Evanston's history of exclusion and discrimination calls for repair, what is happening with our current Reparations programs — and consider how we, as people of faith, are called to act at this significant moment in history.

The workshop has been developed and is presented by a collaboration of Evanston churches that are fellow members of Interfaith Action.

It's **SNAPGap** time again. I'm pleased to report that our SNAPGap distribution at the August 10th Producemobile worked very well. We served 177 households with laundry sheets (much easier/lighter than detergent) and items in surplus from July. Since April 2021, SNAPGap has given out approximately 3,135 items to people in need.

Moving from vehicle distribution to August's walk-up delivery system at Robert Crown Community Center, we witnessed first hand how much these items were appreciated. As people finished collecting their produce, they were visibly surprised and delighted to receive necessities seldom offered elsewhere. Have to say that it was very gratifying. And it couldn't happen without you spreading the word to our faith communities. Thank you! Thank you!

For September 14th, Trinity Lutheran Church will be coordinating, and we will collect:

- All purpose cleaner
- Disposable razors and shaving cream
- Dove bar soap (an obvious preference)
- Fingernail clippers

This is an ancient Japanese expression whose literal translation is "three years on top of a rock." The phrase implies that even if one is sitting on a hard rock, if you do it for three years, you get good at it/used to it. Any time I reach the 3-year mark on something I'm reminded of this expression.

This past August 7, 2021 was my third anniversary with Immanuel. When I first started the job in 2018, I didn't feel like I was climbing on top of a rock so much as a mountain because I had much to learn. I'd never worked for a church and nonprofit organization before. I'm not Lutheran. It was a daunting learning curve which eventually leveled into a lively work life. Then Pr. Keith announced he was moving onto a Photo by Ben Karpinski on Unsplash new position at Churchwide and about a month later, the great pandemic hit.



All right, now it was starting to feel like I'd climbed upon a hard rock, with the uncertainly and changes to my job. But I wasn't alone—the entire planet had started to sit on a large, extremely hard rock called Covid-19. Going on 18 months later, we are still uncomfortable, shifting our weight and trying not to fall off the rock. We try a new position and it doesn't work out, so we ponder something else. Some of us hate this rock but the rock has become all that we know. Some decide we need a soft cushion and a lot of self-care if we're going to survive sitting on this rock. Others refuse to understand that the rock is hard and teeter in misery, wanting the rock to change into something it never will be.

For my experience, sitting and staying on the rock not only has meant being flexible and adaptable but also knowing where to find the sources of support. Thanks to God's grace, I've never felt without any support at Immanuel and I'm grateful for being able to serve the congregation as the pandemic rages. Thank you, Congregation! Actually, what started as a mountain, turned into rock and now feels like a familiar chair.
