The Great Three Days

The Great Three Days—Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Saturday's Great Vigil of Easter—though chronologically three days and seemingly three services, are actually liturgically a single, long service that gradually unfolds the unified mystery of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection.

Each evening we will hear part of the great drama and will experience once more the mighty acts of God in Christ Jesus, the Savior of the World. As much as we might want to, we cannot go straight to the glory of Easter and resurrection without first passing through the way of fellowship and mutual servanthood, the dark night of betrayal, the long day of suffering, the death on the Cross, the sealing of the tomb, and the anguished, numb waiting of Jesus' friends as they wonder what comes next ... and as they begin to realize the good news that Jesus has been raised from the dead.

These services are wonderfully participatory, and make use of all the senses. We invite you to enter into the drama, responding with your whole being to the awesome story of salvation.

About tonight's worship...

This is the first of the Great Three Days: Holy Thursday, or "Maundy" Thursday. The word "maundy" was a garbled pronunciation of *mandatum*, the Latin for word for "commandment." As we will hear in tonight's Gospel reading, it is on this night, as Jesus enjoys a final meal with his friends, that he gives "a new commandment"—the commandment to love one another just as Jesus has loved us. Jesus gives this commandment as he gives up his role as master, and stoops as a humble servant to wash the feet of those who by rights should be washing his feet. This willingness to lovingly bend and serve one another is the very last message that Jesus wants to leave with his followers. That is the core of the Good News for the first part of this evening.

For those who wish, Pastor Mark will lay on hands and pronounce individual absolution for sins as we come to the end of Lent, the time of repentance, and as we prepare for the joy of Easter. We will sing together, pray together, and hear the words of scripture together. Then the ministers will lead us in washing one another's hands or feet as we live out the reality that we are servants to one another. And then, just as Jesus and his friends did that night, we will share the Lord's Supper together.

And then, just as Jesus and his disciples sang a song and went out into the night to go pray in the Garden of Gethsemane, we will enter into a time of prayerful meditation, followed by the solemn stripping of the altar in preparation for Good Friday as a psalm is sung. We strip away all those adornments that might distract us from our focus on the Cross that lies ahead. And then we go out into the night to wait to hear the next part of the story.

- P Lord, forgive us.



Exodus 12:1-14

R A reading from Exodus.

¹The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: ²This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. 4If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. ⁵Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. ⁶You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. ⁷They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. 8They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. ⁹Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. 10 You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. ¹¹This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. ¹²For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. ¹³The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

¹⁴This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.



Gospel John 13:1–17, 31b–35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. [...] Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once.

Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Judeans so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

The ministers will lead the Assembly in a rite of washing either hands or feet.


You may wash the hands of other family members who come forward with you, or the ministers will wash you.






Preface

Thanksgiving at the Table

Blessed are all who come in your name, and blessed is Jesus, your Christ, who fed the hungry and healed the hurting, who embodied your liberation and stood with tender courage against all the systems that divide us. Even as the Empire of Power threatened his death, he gathered with his beloved to offer the gift of himself and the gift of life that cannot be taken.

About tonight's worship...

Throughout his ministry Jesus turned things on their heads: the last became first, the poor were blessed, the blind could see. In parable and miracle Jesus brought a dominion that was set against the kingdoms of this world. In the circumstances of his death, he did away with the accepted structures of power and weakness, justice and retribution. Jesus' crucifixion was the ultimate manifestation of the paradox of the dominion of God: the king who only days before rode triumphantly into the royal city is now crucified as a criminal. The Messiah is a suffering servant. The Son of God is willing to die so that we might live.

John's gospel tells the story of how God accomplished, in Jesus, the fulfillment of scriptural prophecy about the one who would bring God's people into reconciliation with God's own self. We will hear a translation that minimizes the anti-semitic bent of John's gospel. In the story of the passion, Jesus' inexorable journey toward the cross, which is the culmination of this prophecy, picks up speed. Then, with Jesus' dying breath, the journey is over. With the words "It is finished," or better translated, "It is accomplished," Jesus' mission is complete. His passion and his suffering are finished; the centuries-long wait for the Messiah is finished. God's ultimate disruption of our efforts to save ourselves, and the astounding reversal of human expectations, is accomplished.

On this evening, as we meditate on the consequences of God's sacrifice, the church proclaims the good news that the Cross of Christ is not only necessary, but also sufficient for our salvation. With the command of Maundy Thursday lingering in our ears and hearts, Good Friday reminds us that the freedom to obey Jesus comes as a gift from God through the Cross of Christ. At the Cross, our old life of captivity to sin is finished, and our new life of discipleship begins.

In our worship, we cry out with the psalmist, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?", the same words that Jesus cries out on the Cross. We pray for the whole world that Christ came to redeem. We stand in reverence and then bow in awe as the Cross is brought before our eyes. We hear the Crucified One speak to us in the ancient words of the Solemn Reproaches, challenging us for the ways in which we fail to live as people of the Cross and of the Resurrection. We then contemplate the Cross on which was hung the Savior of the whole world. We then sing a song of praise, hear a loud sound to symbolize the stone sealing the tomb, and when we are ready, we depart.

Thanks be to God, Good Friday and the Cross are not the end of the story. Tonight's liturgy is a continuation of last evening's worship, and is completed tomorrow evening as we gather for the Great Vigil, where we will hear the stories of God's saving acts throughout all of history, and then will join in the feast as we hear the great good news of the Resurrection proclaimed. Please join us!

The ancient title for this day—the "Triumph of the Cross"—reminds us that the church gathers this day not to mourn but to celebrate Christ's life-giving passion and to find strength and hope in the Tree of Life.

Solemn Reproaches Michael Krentz


The Solemn Reproaches are the voice of the Crucified One speaking to us, calling on us to remember the mighty and gracious things God has done for us in spite of our failings.

The Great Vigil of Pascha April 16, 2022, 7:30 PM



About tonight's worship...

The Great Vigil of Pascha ("Passover") is a special night. We hear some of the greatest stories of our faith heritage unfurled in one setting, like telling our shared stories around a fire. In hearing these stories, we connect with the heart of our own faith story.

As the people of God, we have through history ached in suffering, celebrated in praise, begged for help, offered generous service, and in general led lives full to the brim. The stories of the Easter Vigil remind us of the range of faithful moments, including both joy and desolation. Witnessing these ancient stories, we discover anew how God's great story is for *us*. These stories are indeed *our* stories.

God brings us through fire and water, out of death and night, welcoming us into the light of life. This night we light the Paschal candle from a new fire. By the light of that flame we gather in a circle to hear and to remember who we are and where we have come from. We gather at the baptismal font, giving thanks for water that is a sign of death to sin and rebirth into eternal life and for the fire of the Spirit, animating ashes and dry bones. Tonight, as the church around the world welcomes new brothers and sisters in Christ through baptism, as we ourselves welcome two new brothers, and as we renew our baptismal vows, we remember how on the first Easter Christ welcomed Mary: calling her by name, bringing her out of weeping into the joyous light of Easter morning.

Through the drama of the Great Vigil, our communities of faith are invited to honest reflection and real renewal. On this night we remember that God's great story holds all of our little stories: the joy and fear of a new baby, changing jobs, cancer, celebrating friendship, waiting for new faith to emerge. All of us are written into God's ongoing and welcoming narrative of passionate grace and service.

This is the night! This is our Passover with Christ from darkness to light, from bondage to freedom, from death to life. Tonight is the heart of our celebration of the Great Three Days and the pinnacle of the church's year. The resurrection of Christ is proclaimed in word and sign, as we gather around a pillar of fire, hear the ancient stories of our faith, renew the promises of our baptism at the font, and share the food and drink of the Promised Land as we gather around the Table. Raised with Christ, we go forth into the world, aflame with the great good news of the Resurrection.

Welcome and Explanation

The Great Vigil begins after sunset after darkness has begun to descend, as a reminder of the darkness that is pierced by the blinding light of the resurrected Christ. The service begins outside.

The new fire represents God's creative energy that is sparked again and again in our world. The Paschal Candle recalls for us the pillar of fire that led the Children of Israel through the desert, and represents for us tonight the light of Christ, leading us to freedom.

Your unlighted candle represents the soul waiting to be kindled by the fire of God's Spirit.

Greeting

P The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

A Amen.

P Sisters and brothers in Christ, on this most holy night when our Savior Jesus Christ passed from death to life, we gather with the church throughout the world in vigil and prayer. This is the passover of Jesus Christ. Through light and the word, through water, bread and wine, we proclaim Christ's death and resurrection, share Christ's triumph over sin and death, and await Christ's coming again in glory.

Lighting of the New Fire

The new fire is lighted.

P Let us pray. Eternal God, in Jesus Christ you have given the light of life to all the world. Bless this new fire, and increase in us a desire to shine forth with the brightness of Christ's rising, until we feast at the banquet of eternal light; through the Sun of righteousness, Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Presiding Minister traces the symbols on the Paschal Candle as he prays.

Procession

The Assisting Minister leads the assembly to the entrance of the worship space and holds the paschal candle at the entrance of the sanctuary for the assembly to light their candles and bring the light into the darkened sanctuary.

The Assisting Minister then bring the paschal candle into the sanctuary.

The candle is held aloft three times along the way, to sing our thanks for Christ, our Light.

The Cantor sings and the Assembly responds. At the entrance to the worship space:

The Paschal Candle is placed in its stand.




Easter Proclamation

The Cantor sings out an ancient hymn of praise called the Exsultet (Latin for "Rejoice!").

The song announces Christ's resurrection and calls on all creation to join in praise and thanksgiving.

Please join in singing after the Cantor, as you are directed.

L Rejoice, now, all heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels!
Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ is risen!
Celebrate the divine mysteries with exultation;

For this indeed is the Paschal Feast in which the true Lamb is slain, by whose blood the doorposts of the faithful are made holy.

As we listen, we hear how God has acted in the past, knowing that God is acting now in the resurrection of Jesus and in our own deliverance from all that binds us.

But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel John 20:1–18

P The holy gospel according to John.

A Glory to you, O Lord!

¹Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." ³Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. ⁴The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, ¹and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. ⁵Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; ⁵for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. ¹¹Then the disciples returned to their homes.

¹¹But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; ¹²and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. ¹³They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." ¹⁴When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). ¹⁷Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.
