Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

In John's gospel Jesus says, "You will know the truth and the truth will set you free." Thus, in pursuit of this freedom we have joined with other communities of faith in Evanston to participate in the process of reparations. Reparations involves more than



just a financial component, for we must truly acknowledge our history of injustice and seek ways to repair the damage of discriminatory practices. In their book, *Reparations: A Christian Call for Repentance and Repair*, Duke Kwon and Gregory Thompson state that reparations are needed to repair and restore a threefold theft. The theft of truth. The theft of power. And the theft of wealth. They say that we must resist "temptations to flee from reality. Temptation to blind ourselves to the truth

about who we are as a people and a society, and what will finally be required of us if we are to heal. To succumb to this temptation is to undergo a kind of death – the death of ourselves and of our neighbors and of the communities we share. To resist these temptations is to embrace freedom: freedom from blind complicity with evil and freedom to rejoice in a world made new." (p.48)

I want to know the truth. I want to see more clearly the reality of white supremacy that has privileged me at the expense of others. I invite you to join with me on this journey of seeking truth that leads to freedom. Our Sunday morning *Feeding Our Faith*, sessions for September will focus on Reparations. Pastors Kwon and Thompson will be two of our guides. This discussion class will continue to build on the foundation of the many anti-racism justice initiatives Immanuel congregation has undertaken. As many of us have discovered together, this is a subject in which our ongoing learning will be lifelong.

On June 13th congregational president, Dana Baron, and I participated with 15 other faith communities in the kickoff of the Evanston Interfaith Community Support of Reparations. With Church Council support we committed our congregation to raise awareness and education about the need for reparations, along with encouraging contributions to the Reparations Fund. Next January, near MLK day, this coalition of faith communities will publicly share the joint amount of money raised and events held. We want to track any contributions that our members make to the Reparations Fund, so if you have already contributed directly to the Evanston Community Foundation Reparations fund, or if you do make a direct contribution, please let me know, so that I can track an Immanuel total. The Stark committee recommended a \$850



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contribution to the fund, which the council approved at its August meeting. Our Sunday School children decided this past Spring to give \$150. I challenge the congregation to at least match the \$1,000 we've given already. I trust that this will easily happen if we resist the temptation to avoid knowing the truth that sets us free. Our learning together will help us discover how we're called to respond. I look forward to joining with you in this venture.

September 11 & 18 - A Christian Case for Reparations & Dismantling White Suprem-

acy – Duke L. Kwon & Gregory Thompson, co-authors of *Reparations: A Christian Call for Repentance and Repair*

Duke L. Kwon (MDiv, ThM, Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary) is the lead pastor at Grace Meridian Hill, a neighborhood congregation in the Grace DC Network committed to building cross-cultural community in Washington, DC. Kwon is active in public conversations around race, equity, and racial repair in the American church, and he lectures on these topics around the country. His work has appeared in the *Washington Post*, *Christianity Today*, and *The Witness*.

Gregory Thompson (PhD, University of Virginia) is a pastor, scholar, artist, and producer whose work focuses on race and equity in the United States. He serves as executive director of Voices Underground (an initiative to build a national memorial to the Underground Railroad outside of Philadelphia), research fellow in African American heritage at Lincoln University (HBCU), and visiting theologian for mission at Grace Mosaic Church in Washington, DC. He is also the cocreator of *Union: The Musical*, a soul and hip-hop-based musical about the 1968 sanitation workers' strike. Thompson lives in Charlottesville, Virginia.

God's Work Our Hands 2022 Items Needed for Evanston Service Organizations



Our congregation, along with Grace Lutheran Church, will engage in service to our community on **Saturday**, **September 10th**. We are asking for donations of items to four important local service efforts listed below.

You can drop items off at the Grace Lutheran Church parking lot at 1430 South Blvd between 9:00 am and 11:00 am on Saturday, September 10th where volunteers will receive them. **Or you can bring your items to Immanuel on Sunday, September 4th**, and we will make sure they get to Grace Lutheran.

 Interfaith Action of Evanston Snap Gap Collection. Interfaith Action Evanston (IAE) operates the monthly Producemobile, which distributes fresh produce to Evanston families experiencing food insecurity. For more than a year, IAE has added SNAPGap, collecting and distributing items that most of us consider necessary—toilet paper, toothpaste, shampoo, laundry detergent, etc.—but are not eligible for purchase with federal benefits. Especially needed are:

Toothpaste Toothbrushes Deodorant

2. Hospitality Center at St. Mark's Church offers breakfast and a safe place to sleep. Job counselors provide advice, encouragement, and workshops for guests seeking employment. Computer trainers assist with online applications and resumes. The Center needs:

3. Grace Lutheran Little Free Pantry is stocked with canned goods and other nonperishable food items donated by members of the congregation and neighbors. Needed are:

4. Connections for the Homeless is the leading agency in the northern suburbs delivering essential services to people facing homelessness and housing insecurity during the pandemic. They especially need:

Winter jackets, hats, gloves, and scarves Deodorant

Walking the Labyrinth

A labyrinth is a maze-like structure sometimes found constructed on the ground outdoors, or, in floors in churches or public areas. Unlike garden or corn mazes that are constructed to confuse the visitor, a labyrinth has no false pathways or dead ends. Rather, it is a single meandering pathway which leads the walker to the center. Labyrinths have been found in cave art, carved in wood, and in blanket and basket designs. The earliest have been traced back over 3500 years and have been found in many different areas around the globe.

Labyrinths have been used for rituals, ceremonies, and play. They are most well-known as a means of doing walking meditation. We have heard so much recently about the benefits of meditation. However, not everyone is comfortable sitting quietly for extended periods. Walking meditation may be more suitable if this is the case.

We are lucky to have a local labyrinth located behind The Benedicitine residence on Ridge south of Howard. Kit McCarthy will do a presentation on labyrinths and take a group to walk the labyrinth in October. Time will be announced soon. To read about labyrinths: www.labyrinthsociety.org.

Special Instructions:

We ask that the meal be ready to serve promptly at 6:00 pm so that we can conclude at 6:45 pm respecting students' schedules. The table is

set prior to your arrival, and drinks are provided. Meals usually include a main course, vegetable, salad or fruit, bread is optional, and a dessert.

Since we're just restarting Supper Worship, we anticipate 12-20 students attending (plus your group members), so please check ahead of time. Many bring food already prepared. We have two ovens and one fridge available. We usually have many condiments in the fridge, so, please ask if you need anything in particular. We do ask your help in wiping down the kitchen, stoves, etc. after supper prep. If you choose to leave leftovers, they will be eaten.

Allergies or dietary restrictions:

Currently, we are aware of two students who have nut allergies, and two students who eat a vegan diet. Please don't hesitate to check with us if you have any concerns, and we will try to make you aware as we become aware of specific needs.
