Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

I believe that a key component of my spiritual journey has been getting to know and love myself, not in spite of all my foibles, but rather in the acceptance of my-



self, warts and all. One of the most helpful tools that I've found for developing new insight and compassion for myself, as well as for all the imperfect people that I relate to in this world, is the Enneagram. It helps me to better see and understand myself as I seek to integrate my head, heart and body in the process of becoming fully human.

During the season of Lent our Tuesday evening Spiritual Growth Zoom event will do a deep dive into the Enneagram. If you're not familiar with this spiritual tool, then you may want to do some exploring of it on your own and then con-

sider joining the group that gathers on Tuesday evenings. There are free tests available online that can help you discern which of the nine types best describes your way of being in the world. We will be viewing and discussing a video recording of a 2009 conference presented by the Center for Action and Contemplation featuring Russ Hudson and Richard Rohr titled, *The Enneagram As A Tool For Your Spiritual Journey*. Here is a description: The depth of teaching in this conference goes beyond identifying the nine Enneagram types. The Enneagram is presented as a serious spiritual tool, a tool of remembrance, a pathway to open ourselves to the gift of Presence. Deep study of the Enneagram shows the importance of Grace and awakening of the soul. Gaining clear self-knowledge is a crucial step in this process of becoming fully human. The Enneagram helps us in this journey.

I also want to invite folks to the Feeding Our Faith Sunday morning discussion class. We're going to spend the Sundays in February discussing a book by Valarie Kaur, See No Stranger: A Memoir and Manifesto of Revolutionary Love. We'll be utilizing material to introduce the theme of each chapter, so you don't have to read the book to participate, but doing so will enhance your learning and ability to contribute to the discussion.

I look forward to our Lenten journey together that begins with Ash Wednesday on February 22nd. 20 years ago, I went home after an Ash Wednesday worship in a reflective mode and jotted down this poem:

Smudged
I look into the mirror and see the two black smudges
One horizontal, the other vertical,
the frayed jagged edges not unlike certain parts of my life.
As I ready to wipe the smudge from my forehead,
I wonder what changes will occur on this year's journey?
What smudges in my life will be cleaned away this year?
Washcloth in hand, I do one last thing.
I pause to give thanks for this dust in the mirror,
and this smudge of a cross,
a blessed reminder of my true home.

<u>All Sundays in February</u> - Book Study of Valarie Kaur's <u>See No Stranger</u>

How do we love in a time of rage? How do we fix a broken world while not breaking ourselves? Valarie Kaur—renowned Sikh activist, filmmaker, and civil rights lawyer—describes revolutionary love as the call of our time, a radical, joyful practice that extends in three directions: to others, to our opponents, and to ourselves. It enjoins us to see no stranger but instead look at others and say: You are part of me I do not yet know. Starting from that place of wonder, the world begins to change: It is a practice that can transform a relationship, a community, a culture, even a nation.

Kaur takes readers through her own riveting journey—as a brown girl growing up in California farmland finding her place in the world; as a young adult galvanized by the murders of Sikhs after 9/11; as a law student fighting injustices in American prisons and on Guantánamo Bay; as an activist working with communities recovering from xenophobic attacks; and as a woman trying to heal from her own experiences with police violence and sexual assault. Drawing from the wisdom of sages, scientists, and activ-



ists, Kaur reclaims love as an active, public, and revolutionary force that creates new possibilities for ourselves, our communities, and our world. See No Stranger helps us imagine new ways of being with each other—and with ourselves—so that together we can begin to build the world we want to see.

We will watch some videos to introduce the main concepts so you don't have to read the book to participate, but it will deepen your learning.

Quilt Blessing—January 22, 2023

People boxed up all of the quilts after the church "blessing" service on January 22 42 boxes in all! The following Thursday Chris Djuric rented a Uhaul cargo van and with the help of Laurie Stivers, Barb Miller and Pastor Mark, packed that van full. She and her daughter Keziah then drove out to Elgin, IL to a Church of the Brethren warehouse. Church of the Brethren is a co-conspirator with Lutheran World Relief in the quilt and kit ministry. A man helped unload the boxes onto palettes--we filled 3 palettes--and then he showed them the semi trailer he would move the palettes to. He said they pack the trailer floor to ceiling with boxes of quilts and kits. Once full, it's driven to the LWR warehouse in Maryland and another empty trailer takes its place.











Thank you, my friends, for your presence and generous response to Interfaith Action's Walk for Warmth. The weather held off and let us start our day with purpose, fellowship, and a good walk.

Time for SNAPGap!

As you may recall, Interfaith Action operates the monthly Producemobile at the Robert Crown Community Center, which distributes fresh produce to Evanston's families experiencing food insecurity. For almost two years, Interfaith has added SNAPGap, collecting and distributing items that most of us consider necessary—toilet paper, toothpaste, shampoo, laundry detergent, etc.—but are not eligible for purchase with federal benefits.

Today is the first of four times in 2023, when we will seek personal hygiene items from our faith communities and from all interested individuals. Items collected in the next few weeks will be distributed on Valentine's Day, February 14. We won't collect again for another three months, so we want to gather as much as possible for this distribution. For the months in between, we will distribute toilet paper, purchased in bulk, and laundry sheets, donated by Earth Breeze.

<u>For February, we are collecting shampoo, soap, toothbrushes, and toothpaste</u>. Shampoo has become quite expensive. This time, I looked for a moderately-priced shampoo that received good reviews from various sources, and I've included a bar shampoo for the first time to help reduce plastic. I will be curious about our recipients' response. They very much like the laundry sheets that are plastic-free. Items for collection and distribution on February 14: shampoo, soap, and toothbrushes/toothpaste. "Why we should care about Luther: Martin Luther on the Holy Spirit and the Christian Life"





We invite you to join us for an extraordinary 4-part series, sponsored by LSTC Learning Community series, that explores the topic, "Why We Should Care about Luther: Martin Luther on the Holy Spirit and Christian Life."

Dr. Candace Kohli, assistant professor of Lutheran Systematic Theology and Global Lutheranism at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, will lead this dynamic course Sunday for 4 Sundays, beginning February 26 from 6:00 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. Or you can join a facilitated session using Sunday's session recording, beginning March 1 on Wednesdays from 7:00pm – 8:30pm.

As a Luther scholar and esteemed member of the LSTC faculty, Dr. Kohli (pronounced Ko-lee) is an enthusiastic fan of Martin Luther. As she tells her students, "Luther's cool for multiple reasons. Unlike other theologians, he's animated, and you get a sense of his personality. He's rude, he's bawdy, he talks about excrement and there's something amusing about him. You get a sense of him as a person. His ideas are totally revolutionary, and they literally changed the world."
