Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

Back in the decade of my 30's, Henry Nouwen's writings inspired a hunger to grow deeper in my spiritual journey. An apt example from the introduction of Henri's book, *Reaching Out: The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life* published in 1975 illustrates what drew me in and also how this would become a lifelong venture encompassing every aspect of my life:

"When after many years of adult life I ask myself, "Where am I as a Christian?" there are just as many reasons for pessimism as for optimism. Many of the real struggles of twenty years ago are still very much alive. I am still searching for inner peace, for creative relationships with others and for the experience of God, and neither I nor anyone else has any way of knowing if the small psychological changes during the past years have made me a more or a less spiritual man.

We may say, however, one thing: In the middle of all our worries and concerns, often disturbingly similar over the years, we can become more aware of the different poles between which our lives vacillate and are held in tension. These poles offer the context in which we can speak about the spiritual life, because they can be recognized by anyone who is striving to live a life in the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

The first polarity deals with our relationship to ourselves. It is the polarity between loneliness and solitude. The second polarity forms the basis of our relationship to others. This is the polarity between hostility and hospitality. The third, final and most important polarity structures our relationship with God. This is the polarity between illusion and prayer."

Nouwen hints how prayer can lift the veil, giving us a glimpse of ourselves and our world as we truly are. I recall Jesus once saying, "You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." I've come to believe that the main purpose of any spiritual practice is to unmask illusions and facilitate such freedom. My hunger for this freedom in all three forms

of relationships led me to attend a weeklong spiritual directed silent retreat in which I met with a spiritual director each day for 30-45 minutes. This was my first introduction into the practice of spiritual direction, which I've continued to this present day. 19 years ago, I enrolled in a 2-year Spiritual Direction Internship to become a Spiritual Director. The simplest way I know to describe spiritual direction is that it is taking the time to pay closer attention to the underlying movements of the spirit in your life. The spiritual director doesn't tell one what to do, but rather assists them in this process of paying attention.

Kit McCarthy, who is also a trained spiritual director, has joined me in facilitating Spiritual Direction Groups in which 3 to 5 participants assist one another in this process of paying closer attention. We are currently forming new groups that meet once a month for 90 minutes, and we're asking for a 9-month commitment. Please contact either one of us if you would like to participate in this sacred venture. And you don't have to be a member of Immanuel to participate.



Items Needed for Local Service Organizations

Our congregation, along with Grace, St. Paul's, and St. Timothy's Lutheran Churches, will join together to serve the community for God's Work Our Hands on Sunday, September 10th. In addition to doing service projects, we will collect donations of items for four important local service efforts listed below.

Interfaith Action of Evanston Snap Gap Collection. Through its SnapGap program, Interfaith Action Evanston (IAE) collects and distributes necessary items that are not eligible for purchase with federal benefits. Especially needed are:

Toothpaste -Toothbrushes—Shampoo

2. Grace Lutheran Little Free Pantry is stocked with nonperishable food items donated by members of the congregation and neighbors. Needed are:

Canned Goods - Other non-perishable food Items

3. Connections for the Homeless is the leading agency in the northern suburbs delivering essential services to people facing homelessness and housing insecurity during the pandemic. They need:

At Home in Evanston: Diverse Experiences of Our City is a film of interviews that showcase a range of perspectives on living in Evanston today. How did we come here? Why do we stay? What unites us? What divides us? This documentary film was created by Performance in Place Theatre Company partners Lesley Delmenico and Caroline Latta, with De Paul film-maker Alex Sherman and NU graduate student co-collaborator Shelby Mack. Interviewees (portrayed by local professional actors) include: a Fifth Ward resident eligible for reparations, a retirement home dweller, a second-generation Latina, an Asian graduate student, an unhoused resident, a gay pastor, and a young Syrian refugee.
