Facilities


- Our parking lot is located on the south side of the church off Sherman Avenue. You may park in the lot at any time, whether for church events or for shopping or other errands in downtown Evanston; weekdays, see the church office at the Lake St. entrance to get a parking pass. Parking meters are free until 1:00 P.M. on Sunday.
- The parking lot entrance is an accessible entrance. An elevator is located just inside that door.
- Restrooms are downstairs near the meeting of the two hallways. Accessible restrooms are located near
 the elevator on both upper and lower levels. A gender-neutral restroom is located on the lower level by
 the elevator.
- We love having children in worship! Activity bags are available from the ushers. There is a nursery and changing/crying room for parents to use, if needed, located downstairs. There are also changing tables in both restrooms on this level, by the elevator. An usher will be happy to direct you.
- Hearing assistance is available. Ask an usher for equipment.
- Wi-Fi is available throughout most of the building. The network is "Immanuel," password "allarewelcome." Please use the Internet responsibly!

Hymn of Light


Please stand as you are able. As the hymn is sung, the candles on and near the altar are lighted. When the large candle is used, the candles are lighted from its flame.

Psalmody


The psalmody begins with Psalm 141, a song of forgiveness and protection.


A Amen.

Week 4 -March 13: Psalm 95, Revelation 5:11-13


Week 5 -March 20: Psalm 143, John 15:26-16:7

Silence follows the reading.


Meditation

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets,






but in these last days God has spoken to us by the Son.


Gospel Canticle

L For public servants, the government, and those who protect us; for those who work to bring peace, justice, healing, and protection in this and every place, let us | pray to the Lord.

L For those who travel, for those who are sick and suffering, and for those who are in captivity, let us | pray to the Lord.

A Lord, have mercy.

L For deliverance in the time of affliction, wrath, danger, and need, let us | pray to the Lord.


A Lord, have mercy.

The litany is followed by one or more additional prayers.

- O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
- A Amen.




