Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

Last month the congregation voted to fix the fellowship hall roof and install solar panels. In conjunction with this project, we're forming a Green Team to guide our ongoing ministry of caring for God's creation. Caring for creation is essential for as humans we're made of the same stuff as the humus of the soil and the water that makes this planet appear blue. Rivers and streams of blood run through us. The health of the planet, especially as our climate shifts, will influence the health of people and creatures everywhere. In this Easter season and the month that we observe Earth Day let us focus on caring for this planet we call home. Let's all take time to pray for our planet and discern what we're called to do to take care of it.

One of my ELCA clergy friends, who teaches homiletics at a seminary, wrote a Lenten devotional booklet on creation care five years ago. I want to share with you the Easter piece. It gives me hope that even as we face a climate crisis, our planet too will ultimately experience resurrection:

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen." (Luke 24:5)

Earth, you took Jesus' body into yourself, into the very heart of your bosom. What did you witness there if not a birth from the womb of your body? Great Stone hewn from the cave, how light you were in the hands of the angels who rolled you away. Quiet Garden in which the women stood, uncomprehending of the miracle before them, how the Crickets must have laughed, how the Flowers must have glowed with joy, seeing the women's faces behold the Resurrected One.

What did you see, Sister Flies, no longer drawn to a decomposing body? How did Jesus appear to you, Brother Birds who whistled the first "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!"? He was the same, yet different. He was filled with new life, yet with scars remaining. So, too, will be your appearance, O Earth, when your resurrection is complete. -Rev. Leah Schade

As an appendix to her ©2001 book, Life Abundant, theologian Sallie McFague (1933-2019) laid out a case for an Ecological Reformation as a Manifesto to North American Middle-Class Christians. Beginning Apr. 4th: Contemplative Vision: Awakening to Beauty, Truth, and Goodness

We'll continue to watch and discuss videos from a conference put on by Contemplative Outreach in 2007 featuring Father Richard Rohr and Father Thomas Keating, two renowned teachers of contemplative spirituality. Richard Rohr is a prolific author and speaker who founded the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Thomas Keating, who died in 2018, was a Trappist monk known as one of the principal developers of Centering Prayer, a contemporary method of contemplative prayer. Contemplation is the well from which all our action in doing justice flows. It keeps the fire of God's love burning and inhibits our burning out.

Successful Donation Drive for

Purple Pantry

At the Indoor Farmer's Market on March 2nd, Immanuel sponsored a drive to collect food and personal care items for Northwestern University's Purple Panty. We were joined by students from Northwestern's Lutheran Campus Ministry.

According to a 2023 article in the journal Public Health, one-third of all college students in the U.S. experience food insecurity--"inconsistent access to enough food to meet basic needs"--because of lack of money or other resources. This rate is greater than the national average for all households. Northwestern University's Purple Pantry addresses this problem by providing food and other essential items to students.
