Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

"In her book, The Power of Meaning: Finding Fulfillment in a World Obsessed With Happiness, Emily Esfahani Smith identified four pillars of meaning:

- **Belonging** Feeling valued and understood by others, and valuing others in return.
- **Purpose** Having long-term goals that reflect your values and contribute to the greater good.
- **Storytelling** Making sense of the world and yourself by weaving your experiences into a narrative. This helps you understand your place in the world and your impact on others.
- **Transcendence** Feeling awe or wonder, and connected to something larger than yourself. This can be experienced in nature, through meditation, music, or dancing.

It struck me that the 4 pillars of Immanuel Lutheran congregation align well with her 4 pillars of meaning, and by living out our 4 pillars we're engaged in living very meaningful God-centered lives. Here is my alignment:

Pillar #1: **We worship God** – this is where we experience **transcendence**. It happens on Sunday mornings, but also in our spiritual practices throughout the week.

Pillar #2: **We work for justice** – our working for justice gives us **purpose** as we practice God's ways of love and care for all creation.

Pillar #3: **We build community** – We often do this through our **storytelling** and listening to others tell their life stories.

Pillar #4: **We welcome all** – No one is excluded for their age, size, color and culture, sexual orientation, gender identity, or even for their beliefs of lack thereof. All people are valued and can find a sense of **belonging** at Immanuel.

Our life together provides us with deep meaning. I invite you to consider how to share your story in ways that reflect how meaningful your life is because we live out these 4 pillars of Immanuel together. Remember that by telling our story we build community.

As we enter into a new calendar year many people make new year resolutions. This year I resolve to find more ways to just simply to tell my meaning-filled stories.

Music in January

As the new calendar year begins, we find ourselves led into the Epiphany season with lots or references to light -the star the Wise Ones follow, the light shown upon Jesus at His baptism, and the light of Freedom. The choir offers an Epiphany anthem by Gustav Holst on January 5th: *Three Kings from Persian Land*. This is followed by the American folk tune *Down to the River* for the Sunday of Jesus' Baptism. We then contribute *Stars in the Sky* based upon Psalm 19 by Rudolph de Lassus. We conclude the month with a South African choral setting of *Freedom*.

2025 Schedule of Topics

January 5, 2025: Cole Arthur Riley: "The Silence of God"—In this talk, Cole explores how individuals can maintain their faith in a seemingly silent God, particularly in times of suffering and distress. Cole delves into the complex relationship between trauma and spirituality. Cole suggests that, rather than losing belief, individuals can engage in practices that foster a deeper presence to both themselves and the world around them, even in the absence of clear signs of God's presence.

January 12, 2025: Dr. Moshe Szyf: "Inheriting Trauma"—Dr. Szyf delves into the fascinating science of epigenetics and its profound implications for understanding intergenerational trauma. Epigenetics refers to how environmental factors—such as stress, trauma, and life experiences—can influence gene expression without changing the DNA sequence itself. This talk explains how trauma experienced by one generation can leave biological marks on the genes, which may then be passed down to subsequent generations.

January 19, 2025: Scott Mitchell: "Fringe Dwellings"—Scott reflects on the journey of being accepted as a gay individual in a world that often marginalizes LGBTQ+ voices. He highlights the importance of finding loving and supportive communities, especially those that are typically overlooked or excluded by mainstream society. Scott shares personal experiences of finding belonging in unusual places and shows us all how we can better love those that are "othered" in society.

January 26, 2025: Sister Theresa Sullivan: "Help, Help, Help: Am I a Savior or a Servant?"—Sister Theresa Sullivan discusses the profound impact of serving others, emphasizing that it's not just an obligation but a gift. She explains that seeing service as a privilege, rather than a burden, can transform the way we approach help-ing others. The talk highlights the deep responsibility that comes with caring for those around us, acknowledg-ing that it requires effort, empathy, and sometimes sacrifice.

Christmas Trombones

The Chicago Trombones returned to Immanuel on Sat. Dec. 7, 2024 for another delightful holiday concert in the sanctuary. The performance was held at the same time of the Indoor Farmers' Market, so patrons of the market got an extra Christmas musical treat that morning. Immanuel's Sara Mauk is a member of the ensemble and serves as liaison.
