Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

Ash Wednesday on March 5th begins our Lenten journey, as we invite God to strip away the unnecessary baggage that we've been carrying, readying for the new life that the Easter season will bring. During our midweek Lenten worships each Wednesday we'll be using Holden Evening Prayer for our liturgy with Scripture and meditation focused on the theme of **Holy Lament**. Each week we will consider what it means to sit with our grief rather than try to push it aside. We will discover that many faithful believers have wrestled with grief, sorrow, and questions for God about why the innocent suffer. Lament is one of the most faithful things we can do.

When we approach God with honesty and humility, and we admit that some things are too big for our hearts to bear, we will find not a disapproving God but one who weeps with us. Here are the subthemes for the 5 weeks:

Week 1: What is Lament Week 2: "Little" Laments

Week 3: Lament from the Depths

Week 4: Individual Lament
Week 5: Communal Lament


I sense that many people have been grieving the political climate in our nation becoming less open and welcoming to immigrants and to those in the LGBTQIA+ community. The threat of increased climate disasters grows as regulations on fossil fuel drilling and burning are loosened. The gap between rich and poor widens. Our constitutional system of checks and balances faces challenges. Another global health pandemic may be coming soon. We're living through some very trying times and have much to lament about.

I trust that we will find a God who can take our grief, frustration, and disappointment and transform them into holy joy and renewed hope. We will learn, ultimately, that Jesus' death on the cross—the place to which the season of Lent leads us—is the reason we never mourn as those without hope. The beauty of Holden Evening Prayer will assist us in holding our grief with trust and hope.

Being together in this community of faith also provides us with resilience, support, and direction. I invite you to join our Sunday morning, **Feeding Our Faith**, Adult dis-

cussion sessions, 9 am -10 am in-person or online. The focus will be on our 2nd and 4th pillars as in our working for justice we learn about how to counter Christian Nationalism (3/2, 3/9, & 3/30). We'll also focus on strengthening our intentionality in welcoming all (3/16 & 3/23). Check out our website for details and links to the videos that we'll watch and discuss.

I pray for the Spirit to guide our growth as we journey together during this Penitential Season.

Music in March

We kick off March with a lovely chorale-like setting of the story of the Transfiguration by William D. Thompson and then quickly move into Lent. The choir will offer Antonio Lotti's "Miserere mei Deus" (Have mercy on me, Oh God) for the Ash Wednesday service to begin this penitential season.

This is followed by a moving arrangement of the Spiritual "We Shall Walk Through the Valley" by Undine Smith Moore. The choir will then sing a setting of Psalm 27:10, "Hide Not Thou Thy Face From Us" by the 16th century composer Richard Farrant. This is followed by another Psalm setting by Claude Goudimel, "As the Deer, for Water Yearning" sung in French and English. The ILC choir finishes the month with a rousing setting of the chorale "Lord, Thee I Love with All My Heart" by John Ferguson before preparing for the feast days in April.

March 2, 2025 - Ending Christian Nationalism by Amanda Tyler, Exec. Director of BJC, Baptist Joint Commission for Religious Liberty

March 9, 2025 - Dietrich Bonhoeffer, A Story of Courage and Faith

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German theologian, is a Christian hero for many. Executed by the Nazis just days before the end of WWII for his participation in a plot to assassinate Hitler, Bonhoeffer is hailed as a 20th-century martyr. But Bonhoeffer struggled with a moral dilemma – his religious views were in stark contrast to the evil he saw all around him. He chose to face possible imprisonment and execution and to remain faithful to the principles of his belief in God. Across the political and theological spectrum, Bonhoeffer is celebrated as an icon of true Christianity and his theological writings are classics throughout the Christian world.

March 16, 2025 - "Evangelism 101: What You Really Need to Know" by Rev. Dave Daubert, author of The Invitational Christian

Have you ever wondered about how to do effective Evangelism? Maybe the thought of Evangelism scares you? Have you ever had a scary Evangelism Encounter? Evangelism is an important part of our life of faith and it doesn't have to be scary.

March 23, 2025 - "Making People Feel Seen: How to do it Right" by David Brooks, NY Times columnist

March 30, 2025 - White Christian Nationalism and the Church with Rev. Jim Wallis

The founding Director of the Georgetown University Center on Faith and Justice, discusses his book, *The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy.* He argues that the civic promotion of fear, hate, and violence as the trajectory of our politics under a banner of Christian Nationalism should be faced to contend with a greater response of a civic faith of love, healing, and hope to defeat it.




Confirmation Class Service Project at Shore Line Place

Formed in 2024, the Ravenswood Trombone Quartet represents some of Chicago's busiest trombone performers and educators. Hailing from as close as Belmont and Ashland to as far as Atlanta, Georgia, they

explore the 500-year history of their instrument with curiosity and creativity. Musicians include Robyn Smith, Corey Sansolo, Catie Hickey, among others.

The performance on March 15th includes a variety of selected works, including Achieved Is the Glorious Work by Franz Joseph Haydn from The Creation; O dulcis amor Jesu by Caterina Assandra, Two Pieces for Trombone Quartet by Felix Mendelssohn, Suite, Op. 82 by Flor Peeters, Solitude Chorales by Quinn Mason, Blues Melba by Melba Liston, Lament by J. J. Johnson, and Mr. Sandman by Pat Ballard. Admission is free.
