#### Some Food for Thought from the Pastor

I want to highlight how we will be hosting the Interfaith Action (IA) overnight shelter during Holy Week and Easter. In other words, Christ will be spending the night as we retell the Passion story and celebrate his dying and rising. I recently spoke with IA Executive Director, Sue Murphy Berube, about her thoughts on our inviting our overnight guests upstairs on Saturday evening to join us at our Easter Vigil post worship party. I told her that we wouldn't have alcoholic beverages this year like we usually do, but lots of delicious goodies. She said that it would be great for us to invite them.

I think that this could be a wonderful ministry opportunity for us, but I also think that it will require us to take each evening of Holy Week not only to let our guests know that they are invited to join us, but also to build up some anticipation for the party. We can do this through those who volunteer at the shelter sharing their enthusiasm for the great spread of scrumptious food and drink. There is a sign-up sheet next to the coffee hour sign-up in the fellowship hall where you can declare what you intend to bring to the party. This will be valuable information for our shelter volunteers to build anticipation. Keep in mind that we'll need to bring extra of whatever we're preparing to bring.

Like many of you, I've been very concerned about the shifting political sands in our country and wondering what to do. I believe that throwing a party for some of the most vulnerable in our community is a great way for us to counter that lack of compassion being shown on the national stage towards immigrants and LGBTQI+ folks and in reversals of diversity and equity initiatives. We can be people who embody God's compassion for the last and the least, and what better occasion than Easter for us to do so. Someone once said that last will be first and the first last. So, I invite you to consider how else we might convey to our overnight guests that they are honored guests, for they too like us are God's beloved ones.

#### Music in April

We begin the month with a hauntingly beautiful anthem by Jennifer Stammers setting the text by Isaac Watts, "The Loving Lamb." This "sneak-preview" into Holy Week isn't a preview for most of us but prepares us the upcoming week of "the Lamb was slain and lives again, To intercede for me."

We begin Holy Week with an Opening Antiphon by Tomás Luis de Victoria, likely Spain's most famous Renaissance composer. After the English translation of the chant, this piece catapults us into a brief four-part polyphonic of the Palm Sunday entry text. During Offertory, the choir will offer the beloved and famous "God So Loved the World" by Sir John Stainer. Maundy Thursday's anthem will take us through the story of "Gethsemane" by sister team, Linda and Carol Muehlig. On Good Friday, the choir will offer a beautiful setting of the familiar Spiritual "Were You There?" by Bob Chilcott. Easter Vigil will offer some beautiful choral moments for Palestrina's "Sicut Cervus" and Anne Heider's setting of "Go Down, Moses."

The choir and brass for Easter Sunday will also offer "A Quiet Alleluia" by Kenton Coe, "The Lord Is My Strength" by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, and Handel's triumphant "Christ Has Risen!" extrapolated from Judas Maccabeus. The choir will take a well-deserved day of rest the last Sunday of the month before jumping into full swing for the Easter season of May and the celebrations of June!

The ELCA has been working to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. As individuals and institutions continue to reconcile and repair relationships, let's consider what specific role Creation Care Ministries can offer this mission. One step in the process is to listen to people's stories and recognize the roots which reverberate racism and inequity throughout our nation and churches. The 30-minute film, *Are We There Yet*, amplifies voices rarely heard.

This recording captures an intro to the film and discussion afterwards. Calvin Lee and Marisa Prince are Believers of Color – and frustrated Evangelical outsiders – seeking more for the American Christian Church. *Are We There Yet* follows their cross country Road Trip to better understand the Doctrine of Discovery, its connection to contemporary Christian Nationalism, and if it's possible to chart a new course for the American Christian Church.

## Food Drive for Northwestern U. Purple Pantry

# Saturday, April 5, 2025 During the Indoor Farmers' Market (8:00 am – 12:30 pm)

According to a 2023 article in the journal *Public Health*, **1/3 of all college students in the U.S. experience food insecurity-**"inconsistent access to enough food to meet basic needs"--because of lack of money or other resources. This rate is greater than the national average for all households. Northwestern University's Purple Pantry addresses this problem by providing food and other essential items to low-income students living off campus and international students who do not qualify for SNAP.


# Easter Sunday April 20th 10:30 am

RefugeeOne offers *holistic support* for newcomers for **up to five years**—making sure to see them through to becoming self-sufficient community members.

As of January 27, the current administration suspended new refugee arrivals indefinitely and **cut off the usual first 90-days** federal funding aid for refugees who were already here.

RefugeeOne welcomed over **500 refugees in the 6 months** prior to the federal suspension, and despite the cut off of government funding, they are committed to walking alongside these newcomers without disruption of services.

Our support is needed to help with out-of-pocket costs for the newest arrivals who are still getting on their feet.
